This one storey building is of undressed stone, stuccoed and whitewashed, with eight sides of equal dimension and a pyramidal shingled roof. Each of seven facets has a window, the eighth a door. Beneath the eaves is a stepped brick cornice, the building's one decorative detail. There is a relatively recent frame vestibule sheltering the entrance. Within is a single large room. In its earlier years it had two circles of desks, back to back, the outer one for the boys, the inner for the girls.

The school still stands in open farming country, near a lightly travelled crossroads. Behind it is an extensive woodland.

The structure, architecturally interesting in itself, is significant for interpreting the public school history of Delaware and the life of the rural region this specific building served. In 1829 Delaware became the second State to establish a permanent system of genuinely free district public schools. The Octogonal Schoolhouse, opened in 1836, is one of the very few survivals among the buildings erected in the first few years of that movement, and to the best of our knowledge the only one not extensively altered. It is the last in the State of its octagonal design. It is also an example of very rare stone construction in Kent County.

The Octagonal Schoolhouse remined a public school well into the present century. After the consolidation of its districts it was used as a community meeting house until it was presented to the State. Virtually all the long-resident families of the section, including several of local prominence, have had association with this building.
