#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

Located in the village of Fairchild in southeastern Eau Claire County, the former California Wine & Liquor Store is one of the integral components of its two-block business district. At the corner of Farmers and Front Streets, the prime commercial location, the small store is well-situated for appreciation by the village population of five hundred. The former lumbering center of Fairchild, which reached its peak in the late nineteenth century, is oriented with respect to the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad tracks running northwest to southeast from Minneapolis to Milwaukee.

Enriched by its cast iron and glass storefront, the nominated structure is twenty-four by fifty feet in plan and two stories in elevation. The corbelled-brick parapet falls in three grades from front to rear along the north and south sides, enclosing the tar roof. Corbelled brick denticulation between the first and second stories, three applied brick "eye-brow" arches over the second-story windows, and three diamond-set brick panels above the second story add more dimension to the front facade. The double-door entrance, recessed between two full-length display windows, is off-set to the right of center to allow for the second-story entrance at the far left. Queen Anne-style stained glass panels top the front and side extension of the display windows, and form transoms over the doors. Double-hung rectangular windows, like the three on the front facade, puncture the north wall in random fashion on both stories. Two such openings on the south side have been brick-filled to less than half-size. Short interior brick chimneys with molded caps are integrated into the roofline, three on the south side and one on the north. A single course of the rock-faced fieldstone foundation is visible along the side walls. Building materials were supplied by the Menomonie Brick Company, N. C. Foster Lumber Company of Fairchild, and the Phoenix Steele Company of Eau Claire. A small one-story shed, the only exterior addition, was appended to the rear in 1917-18.1

Now used as an antique shop, the interior is essentially unchanged. Elm hardwood floors are still covered with used rock maple, and pine moldings and ceiling are intact. A simple fir banister and newel serve the enclosed stair to the second story, whose interior is divided into four rooms by north-south walls. Additional doorways between rooms were added in the 1920s, and secondary walls in the front and back rooms were removed in the 1970s.


#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The finest of a small number of commercial buildings in the two-block business district in Fairchild, Wisconsin, the former California Wine & Liquor Store is a pristine example of late nineteenth-century small-town commercial construction. With corbelled brick cornices, raised parapet, applied segmental brick arches, and cast-iron storefront filled with plate and stained glass, the building retains all of the original features of the building type of the period. Extensive cosmetic work by the current owner has revealed the handsome details of the original materials.

Originally settled in the 1860s and incorporated in 1880, the face of the town of Fairchild was wholly changed by recurring fires in the 1870s, '80s, and '90s. The largest, the Great Fire of October 21, 1895, destroyed the entire business district. Part of large-scale rebuilding undertaken soon after, the construction of the California Wine & Liquor Store was underwritten by local lumber baron Nathaniel C. Foster through mortgage to Martha Knuth. Subsequent uses have included a saloon, grocery store, and the present antique shop.
