Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Dating from c. 1845, the Dr. Charles H. Best Birthplace of West Pembroke is a vernacular dwelling in the Greek Revival style and is a good example of New England "connected architecture". All components of the property are of frame construction with clapboard sheathing, painted white.

The main house is 2 1/2 stories tall, with a three-bay facade facing south-west in the gable-end. The entablatured entrance with sidelights in sited to the left side of the facade.

Extending south-east from the house is a 1/12 story ell with large gabled dormer facing southwest above a secondary entrance. This entrance is covered by a simple one-story porch just one bay wide.

Running from the north-west side of the house is a series of three connected sections, consisting of a one-story kitchen wing with shed roof and bracketed cornice; a one story carriage house with two barn doors facing south-west; and a 1 1/2-story barn with sliding door facing south-east.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This house derives primary significance as the birthplace on February 27, 1899, of Dr. Charles H. Best, co-discoverer with Sir Frederick Banting of insulin which has since resulted in providing long and happy lives for millions of victims of diabetes, a once fatal disease. Best lived in this house until he was graduated from high school and went on to the University of Toronto. It is the only residence in the United States occupied by him for any length of time.

In 1921, after graduation from the University of Toronto and service in the First World War, Best began a "partnership" in Canada with Banting. The first successful insulin shot given to a human was administered by Best on January 11, 1922. Their work was carried out in the laboratory of John J.R. McLeod and, although the latter did not participate in insulin isolation, the 1923 Nobel Prize in medicine was awarded to Banting and McLeod. Banting was incensed, but accepted the prize and gave half the money to Best.

In addition to his work in the discovery of insulin, Best also introduced the first anticoagulant for the prevention of thrombosis, discovered a new enzyme which destroys histamine, and a new vitamin (choline) which prevents liver damage. He became director of the Banting and Best Department of Medical Research established by the Ontario Legislature at the University of Toronto and also head of the Department of Physiology. He was the recipient of many international awards. He died on March 31, 1978.

In 1959 the Best birthplace was purchased by the American Diabetes Association through a specially created trust. In 1978 title was transferred to the National Trust for Historic Preservation who in turn deeded it to the present owner with an easement and covenants to insure its preservation.
