

Narrative Description

The T.M. Witten and Emma A. Drug Store/Residence, built c.1890, faces east onto Main on a corner lot at the intersection of Union and Main in the downtown area of Jefferson. This Western Store Front/Italianate style building is located amid other late 19th century buildings in the area that include the Jacob Conser building to the north (listed in the National Register of Historic Places). The store and residence, technically a single building, represent simple, practical vernacular architecture of the late 19th century. Both volumes are clad entirely with shiplap siding and are trimmed with plain corner boards.

The storefront is constructed of 2×4 full dimension rough sawn lumber, two feet on center, and sided with 1×6 shiplap siding. The false front incorporates an overhanging cornice that has carved decorative brackets that introduce Italianate stylistic elements. A dentil band is located above the windows, and pilasters (changed to fluted pilasters in 1997) placed between the windows. The storefront windows consist of two-over-two wood windows above wood paneled bulkheads. The recessed entrance has one-over-one side windows, and double doors surmounted by a transom. The entry doors were replaced with replicas and stained glass was added in 1996. There are new asphalt shingles on the roof, and the chimneys have been dismantled due to deterioration.

The Witten store had undergone some changes over the years and the renovation project that was completed in 1998 replaced in kind some of the missing materials, as well as introducing a few new elements to meet current codes and accommodate the building's use as a wellness center. The building was originally supported by brick pads along the perimeter, and had round tree stump sections under the interior support beams. These were replaced by concrete block and reinforced concrete piers in 1995.

Bracing was added in the attic above the store to meet building code requirements. The stairway to the upper level of the store, originally enclosed with a door at the bottom, had been modified. It was opened up and rebuilt in 1997 and balusters were added to meet present code requirements. The mechanical and electrical systems of the store were upgraded to meet current code requirements. Textured sheet rock was added throughout. Some trim was replaced where worn.

The residential section reads as a separate component as it is set back from the front storefront and sidewalk approximately 17'. This bungalow form utilizes the residential form, scale, and massing, with a front porch, side entry and paired double hung windows, typical of houses of the period. This portion of the building was built in phases. The original residence consisted of the current front room and dining room. The first addition, built by 1898,² was the kitchen, downstairs bedroom, pantry, and upper

The Jacob Conser house was built in 1854 and is one of only a few buildings left in Oregon that predate statehood. It was purchased by the town of Jefferson in 1937 and used as a city hall and library. In 1939 it was remodeled as part of a W.P.A. project.

level rooms. The second addition included the back bathroom, storage area, and garage, which was completed by 1913.³

The entry door to the house was replaced with a similar door, with the opening enlarged from 30" to 36" to meet current building code requirements. The stained glass was placed in the transom in 1997. The porch is original except for new decking and a column that replaced a 4 x 4 post. The window sash have been replaced with insulated glass, custom built to each window, and retaining exterior frames and sills.

The dormer above the front porch originally had a shed roof. There was considerable rot and due to the degree of deterioration, the current owners replaced the shed-roof dormer with a gabled dormer in 1996.

Mechanical and electrical upgrades also occurred in the residential portion of the building. The house retains most of the original floor plan. A closet was removed from a bedroom adjacent to the kitchen to enlarge the kitchen. The pantry walls and upstairs closet were replaced, but all original wall openings and placement are original, although some have been enlarged to meet current code requirements. The kitchen cabinet design replicated original cabinets, but the layout is new.

The modifications that have occurred to not significantly impact the building's integrity. The Witten Drug Store/Residence retains most of its original fabric and design and contributes to the historic qualities of Jefferson.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The T.M. and Emma A. Drug Store/Residence on Main Street in Jefferson was the city's first drug store and is significant historically for its association with the commerce and social history of Jefferson. The Witten Drug Store helps to describe the commercial growth of the town of Jefferson. It is architecturally significant as a rare remaining example of a combination store and residence built during the historic period in Jefferson. The building clearly describes the separate uses through the dual form, massing, design and detailing, clearly describing a period when proprietors of small businesses lived adjacent or above their stores.

HISTORY OF JEFFERSON:

Jefferson was originally named Conser's Ferry, for Jacob Conser. He was a pioneer of 1848 and a prominent settler of the Santiam Valley. He took up a claim for land at what is now Jefferson, built a ferry in 1851, started a saw mill in 1853, and erected a flour and grist mill a few years later. The Jefferson Institute (1857-1899), named for Thomas Jefferson, was established in the vicinity of the ferry, and the name of the institute was eventually adopted by the community. The town was settled in 1853, the post office was changed to Jefferson in 1861, and was incorporated in 1870. The town was platted by Jacob and Nancy Conser and James Bates and his wife (name unknown), also early pioneers to the area. Previous to the building of the railroad, steamboats came up the Santiam River as far as Jefferson. The railroad, which reached Jefferson in 1870, made the stage coaches and most of the river navigation obsolete. In 1893, the town had a population of 400. At that time there were several flour and saw mills, four churches, a school, newspaper publisher, two hotels, a library, lodges of various organizations, and a large public hall located in Jefferson. The area around Jefferson was used primarily for the cultivation of hops and fruit. The community was prosperous, and in 1907 boasted having a blacksmith shop, ferry service across the Santiam River, drug store, sawmill, stoking factory, grocery store, general merchandise store, flour mill, furniture and pool hall, butcher shop, barber shop and candy store, bank, hotels and train depot, stagecoach stop, schools, newspaper and doctor's office. In addition, steamboats came up the river adding to a robust community living. The 1950 census showed that Jefferson had a population of 636.

HISTORY OF WITTEN DRUG STORE/RESIDENCE:

The nominated property was sold by Anna Tanzler to Thomas M. Witten for the sum of \$500 in April, 1890. It is believed that the building was constructed by the Wittens at that time as it does appear on an 1890 Sanborn map. T.M. Witten is listed in the local directory as a druggist in 1893, along with other businesses located in the area that included jewelry, hardware, meat market, publishing company, barber, millinery, and general merchandise stores. Little is known about the Wittens. They retained ownership of the property until 1901 when Thomas and Emma Witten sold the property to Charles H. Cusick. Cusick, according to his son, Eugene H. Cusick, was a former pharmacist for the

Oregon State Hospital. As well as continuing to operate the drug store, Charles Cusick was an agent for Wells Fargo Express.

In 1907, Charles and Harriet Ball Cusick sold the property to George C. Mason. Mr. Mason operated the drug store until 1957. His daughter, Virginia Mason, inherited the property. She was a teacher and school librarian. Ms. Mason used this structure as her home. She sold the property to Neil and Wilma Stephenson in 1965, and they used the storefront as a sporting goods store and lived in the house. They sold the property to Gerald and Evelyn Lechron in 1976. The Lechrons lived in the house and used the storefront as a television and appliance repair store as well as to sell second hand furniture and books. Lewis Judy and Toni Gilbert bought the property in 1983, who sold it on contract to two individuals over the next 12 years who were unable to make the payments. In January of 1998, renovation of the property was completed and Toni Gilbert, RN, MA, a holistic nurse, started a wellness center called "Centre of Main St." The building contains offices and group gathering rooms and is no longer being used as a residence.

An example of another store/residence building in Oregon is the John W. Merritt House and Store building in 1888 at 117 East Pine Street in Central Point Oregon (listed in 1992). There is one other structure in Jefferson with a combination store and residence from the turn of the century, however, it has been significantly altered and no longer portrays the historic qualities that are seen in the Witten building.

The Witten Drug Store/Residence represents a period of growth and development in Jefferson. Located at the crossroads of the main streets in Jefferson, the pharmacy was an important aspect of the community and supported a primary need associated with the health and well being of residents. This building is also a rare remaining example of a structure that illustrates the way in which small business owners lived above, next to, or near their commercial enterprises. The growth of the building under ownership of business people is illustrative of a commonplace need to provide living quarters adjacent to a place of business. This store is the only example of the distinctive Western False Front vernacular Italianate type remaining in Jefferson, where, as in most western towns, the wood building tradition was once typical in the commercial center. The Witten Drug Store/Residence retains its original form, materials, and design features, and contributes to the historic qualities of Jefferson.




