eliminated in December, 1941. In addition to their primary function of silviculture and road building, the Cs built several recreational structures in the forest. The Adirondack-style log shelter is the only one of he four built in the area to survive. (The other three were located in adjacent in Peoples Forest on the east side of the Farmington River West Branch.) The shelter is nearly identical in styling to the two primitive shelters built along the Appalachian Trail in Litchfield County (Mohawk State Forest and Housatonic State Forest).

The trail shelter of long tradition and widely known as the Adirondack shelter was probably first developed by hunters and trappers of that region, according to a 1938 National Park Service publication on park structures. For the greatest benefit from the campfire and the utmost in protection from the weather, the historic Adirondack shelter, of which the American Legion CCC shelter is an excellent example, was very low in height, barely affording headroom at the open front. The roof overhung the open side and sloped to the rear. The scant headroom that resulted was not inconvenient in the original use of this type of shelter--sleeping on evergreen boughs laid on the ground. In adapting this historic design to present-day park uses, of which overnight camping was but one, the roof was usually raised to provide more headroom and the whole functional design lost. The American Legion CCC shelter, however, has not been changed and serves as a functional copy of the original Adirondack shelter.

The shelter is located immediately south of the site of Camp White. The U-shaped central parade ground around which the camp buildings were clustered is discernible, but owing to the temporary nature of the camp, the buildings were usually little more than tar-paper shacks. A root cellar, chimney stack from the first-aid house, grease rack, foundations of warehouses, and historic roadway are still When the camp was closed in 1941, the buildings were sold visible. for salvage.
