

19. History

First built in 1798 by John Richardson (1764-1835) a farmer and younger brother of Abijah Richardson, Sr. who built his homestead on the south half of the same lot (VII-1-1). John Richardson moved to Maine in 1821, and for nearly a century thereafter the house belonged to inter-related families. The brothers-in-law Daniel Fiske (owner 1821-1835) and Nathan Holt (owner 1835-1885) were married to sisters of well-known stencil painter Moses Eaton, Jr. Both Fiske & Holt were active in town affairs, and the Fiskes very possibly updated and enlarged the house to its present size before moving into the Old Tavern House in the village in 1835. After Holt's death, the property was left to Mary R. Richardson (his niece by marriage and a daughter of Moses Eaton, Jr.) whose husband Luke was a great-nephew of the original builder. The Richardsons' son Wilson occupied the house until 1907, and subsequent owners were the Orison Moore and Harold Clukay families.
