The James Turk Griffith House, ca. 1850, is a two story log house built on a stone foundation. Now covered by weatherboards, the house was built as a rectangular dogtrot. Ca. 1880 a one story ell was attached to the rear and the dogtrot enclosed. A metal gable roof covers the house and has 2 brick exterior gable end chimneys (one now missing from the east elevation). There is a central brick chimney on the ell. The house's five bay facade (south elevation) has a central entrance with double leaf door. The windows of the house have 2 over 2 lights. A one story porch with metal hipped roof covers the central bays of the facade, and is supported by four chamtered posts.

A fine example of a log dogtrot house, the James Turk Griffith House (ca. 1850) is one of the few such houses remaining in Meigs County. Although other log houses still stand in Meigs County, many have become the cores of frame houses, or have been seriously altered. Although its logs are now covered by weatherboards, the Griffith House retains its original form. James Turk Griffith (1806-1887) moved to Meigs County in 1836. In 1847 and 1849 land grants provided him 320 acres for the farm the house stands on. Trained as a tanner, Griffith was a staunch Unionist and served as a Justice of the Peace from 1864-1870, and as Chairman of the



Significance:

Meigs County Court in 1864-1865. Griffith served in the Tennessee House of Representatives as representative for Meigs, McMinn, and Polk Counties from 1867-1869. The descender of Griffith still work the 320 acre farm, using the house, old barn, and outbuildings to this day. The Griffith Farm was recognized as a Century Farm during the U.S. Bicentennial. Only five farms in Meigs County received this recognition for being farmed by the same family for over 100 years. The Griffith Farm is the only Century Farm with properties eligible for the National Register.

Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:

10. The boundaries begin at a point on Highway 58 275 feet southwest of the intersection of Center Point Road and Highway 58 continuing in a southwestwardly direction along Highway 58 200 feet, thence west 300 feet, thence north 175 feet to a wire fence line, thence east to the beginning. This boundary takes the form of a trapezoid, and due to the lack of property lines or visual boundaries on the west and south sides imaginary boundary lines were established to include the house and approximately 1.5 acres of land on which it sits.
