Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This house conforms to the general description under property type "Resources Associated With Plantation Community Life" and property subtype "Plantation Houses."

The alterations to this house are consistent with the registration requirements. A small bathroom addition, which is not visible from the road, projects from the west side of the house.

A notable feature of this house is that it not only has a porch across the main facade facing the river, but it also has an identical porch on the opposite (land) side, which is visible from the road.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This house is significant as a particularly intact example of the main houses of Georgetown County rice plantations and for its association with Rural Hall, one of several productive plantations on the Black River. Though the plantation was known as Rural Hall as early as 1803 the main house was built c. 1850 by Christopher James Atkinson. Atkinson produced 180,000 pounds of rice with 70 slaves in 1850 and 270,000 pounds of rice with 98 slaves in 1860 at Rural Hall. At his death the plantation passed to a niece, Margaret Thompson, who was the wife of Stephen W. Rouquie. Rouquie, a Georgetown merchant, served as an officer in the "Georgetown Rifle Guards," Company A of 10th South Carolina Infantry, during the Civil War. He planted rice at Rural Hall for over thirty years after the war, producing 90,000 pounds of rice in 1870 and 159,000 pounds of rice 1880. Rouquie sold the plantation after the storms of 1893 and 1898 destroyed his crops and his ricefields.(1)
