Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Richardson Building is a single story rectangular brick building with concrete foundation and running bond painted brick walls. The entrance is obliquely cut in the southwest corner. It contains a cutaway arched double glass door and is flanked by two horizontally recessed brick columns capped with conical forms. The entrance rises to a gabled parapet with flat containing the date "1910."

The south elevation is pierced by a single door alcove recessed about six feet. The wall is divided by pilasters into, from west to east, five sections each containing different elements. The first has a large vertically divided double window, the second contains the alcove, the third two tiers of three industrial windows, the fourth a single door and window, the fifth a wooden door. The west elevation contains seven double hung windows and a single large window at the southwest end. There are two single doors with transoms. All windows and doors on the west are shaded by a metal awning supported by eight metal posts. The north and east elev-tions are stuccoed with transomed doors and quartered windows. On the north elevation two doors were filled in in 1928. The parapet line is corbeled brickwook.

In 1928, a fire destroyed the structures interior. By the end of that year a new roof, and interior were constructed, and the structure returned to its original uses. This alteration has not affected the building's integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Richardson building is significant because it was the focal point of commercial activities in Union City. The southside of the building contained the town post office during this period. The corner section of the building contained the Bank of Union, center of the town's financial dealings, while the western section housed the city's only drug store and pharmacy.

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Both the bank and pharmacy were owned and operated by Dr. R. Richardson who was town doctor, druggist, banker, and builder of the structure. As the town's leading citizen, Richardson dominated local commerical activities in this town of less than 1,000 for most of the building's municipal history. Serving as bank, post office, and pharmacy, the building was the primary commercial center until recently when business activity eastward to the main highway passing through the town.
