Constructed of brick and standing five stories high, this building has a nine bay facade divided into groups of three. The windows are double hung sash with segmental arches on the second through fourth floor and round arched on the fifth floor. The entire. facade is capped by an over-hanging metal cornice supported on brackets. The street-level facade consistes of three stores enframed with brick piers and a metal cornice. The display windows and entrances have been completely remodeled with brick, metal, and plate glass.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.)

This building is historically significant as the offices of the <u>Kennebec Journal</u>, an Augusta newspaper is the longest running paper in Maine still in business, although no longer at this location. Architecturally, the building has local significance as an largely unaltered example of Renaissance design which occupies a prominent site in Augusta's central business district. Unlike its similarly styled neighbors to the south, the Journal Building retains most of its original features, including original sash.

Constructed in 1899, the building was designed by Arthur Wing, a local architect whose career was cut short by an early death in 1912. The <u>Kennebec Journal</u>, which was founded in 1825, occupied several other buildings before the construction of this structure.
