DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The properties included in the Wayside Inn Historic District which are of most importance historically are the Wayside Inn and the buildings always thought of in association with it--the Martha-Mary Chapel, Grist Mill and Schoolhouse. Three architecturally significant buildings which lie east of the Inn complex have been included to afford them protection. All of this district is a part of the larger Historic District established under the provisions of Chapter 40C of the Acts of 1963.

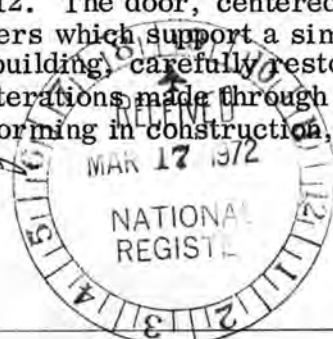
The Wayside Inn District is located in the southwest corner of Sudbury on both sides of the Boston Post Road. A portion of the original Post Road, still dirt, passes directly in front of the Wayside Inn and ends to the west at a small stone bridge on the Inn's property. A later section of the road passes further to the south of the Inn. This is presently called the Wayside Inn Road and is used by visitors to the Inn and residents of nearby property. The heavy volume of through traffic has been diverted to a state highway which forks from the Post Road east of the Inn and passes south of the Inn's property.

At the eastern approach to the district, on the present Post Road, stands a one story, gambrel roof dwelling with a center chimney. Originally the interior of this clapboard cottage was divided into two sections to house the families of a father and son. Thus, the large chimney contains two kitchen fireplaces and two fireplaces at the rear which serviced the sleeping quarters. Although the partitions between the two sections have been removed and other minor alterations and additions have been made over the years, the basic shape and plan of this early 18th century house remains intact.

Just west of this house is the site of a stone garrison house. Nearby is a 1 1/2 story clapboard dwelling, with center chimney, pitched roof and leanto, which reflects the style and architectural details of the 18th century. Its proportions, however, are indicative of the early 19th century.

At the junction of Wayside Inn Road and the newer state highway stands an impressive Greek Revival dwelling with a two story Doric tetrastyle portico. Each of its two wings carries a one story porch with Doric columns which extend the length of the wing facade. This clapboard covered building, known as the Adam Howe House, was bought by Henry Ford when he purchased the Inn.

The Wayside Inn is set among large shade trees. A path, interrupted only by the dirt portion of the old Post Road, leads from the Wayside Inn Road to its front door. The 2 1/2 story building is covered by graduated clapboards and topped by a double pitched (gambrel) roof with two chimneys set in on the ridgepole. The windows on the second story of the five bay main facade are narrow 9/9 sash, while those on the first floor are 12/12. The door, centered on the main facade, is surrounded by unadorned pilasters which support a simple entablature and pediment. The present appearance of the building, carefully restored by the Ford Foundation, is the result of additions and alterations made through the three centuries of its existence. Ells and wings conforming in construction, materials and style are attached to the rear and side.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Wayside Inn of South Sudbury is believed to be the oldest operating inn in the country and is the setting of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's Tales of a Wayside Inn. On that basis the Inn has been certified a Massachusetts Historic Landmark.

Samuel Howe, a carpenter by trade, is believed to have begun the Wayside Inn c. 1700. It then consisted of two rooms, the tap room below and a chamber for guests above. Samuel's son David was granted a license for inn-keeping by the Concord Court in 1716 and kept "Howe's Tavern" until 1746. He added the two rooms now known as Longfellow's parlor and chamber, probably in 1716.

Ezekial Howe, David's son, was landlord from 1746 to 1796 and renamed the Inn "the Red Horse." Ezekial led two companies of Sudbury militia to Concord in answer to Paul Revere's alarm on April 19, 1775, and later served as Colonel under George Washington. The Inn prospered under Ezekial's care and he added four rooms at the rear of the existing structure, including the ballroom which became Longfellow's "Hobgoblin Hall."

Lyman, the fifth Howe to operate the Inn (1830-1861), played host to the group of professors whom Longfellow described in Tales of a Wayside Inn and was himself the poet's model for the landlord, who entertains his guest with "the Midnight Ride of Paul Revere." Because of the popularity of Longfellow's Tales, published in 1863, the "Red Horse" was renamed the "Wayside Inn."

Following Lyman's death in 1861, the Wayside Inn was operated by various Howe heirs and tenants and gradually deteriorated until it was purchased by Henry Ford in 1923. Ford refurbished the Inn and made it the center of a complex of buildings which, like those at his Greenfield Village, Dearborn, Michigan, were intended to keep Americans "in touch" with their past. The Redstone School, built in 1798, was moved to the Inn site from Sterling, Massachusetts, and operated as part of the Sudbury school system from 1927 to 1952. This is claimed to be the schoolhouse attended by Mary Sawyer, about whom "Mary Had a Little Lamb" was written. In the 1920's, the Grist Mill was built with stone taken from the Wayside Inn property. Set near an early millrace, the structure is a reconstruction of a typical 18th century mill, with an overshot water-wheel operating two-ton mill stones. Also in the complex is the Martha-Mary Chapel built by Ford in 1939.

7. Description

About a quarter of a mile west of the Inn, the gristmill (a reconstruction of a typical 18th century mill erected in the 1920's) lies across a field and against a hill near an early millrace. This small rectangular building is constructed of local field stone and covered with a pitched roof.

The Martha-Mary Chapel is set on a knoll surrounded by a large field. This clapboard church, built in 1939, is a composite of the architectural features typical of the New England meetinghouse. The tower with its two-stage octagonal spire rises directly from the main body of the church. On the main facade are two columns set in antis, supporting an entablature which circles the building and the pedimented gable. At the eastern edge of the field stands the little red clapboard schoolhouse built c. 1798. This one room building is covered by a pitched roof and has an entrance centered on its gable end.

8. Significance

The Chapel is a composite of the architectural features typical of the New England meetinghouse and is one of six such buildings Ford had constructed from the same plans.

The Wayside Inn was extensively damaged by fire in 1955 but was carefully restored with the aid of a Ford Foundation grant. The Inn was reopened in June, 1958, under the direction of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. In 1960, administration was taken over by a local committee, the Trustees of the Wayside Inn.

Three architecturally significant buildings which lie to the east of the Wayside Inn have been included in this nomination to afford them protection (see description under physical appearance).

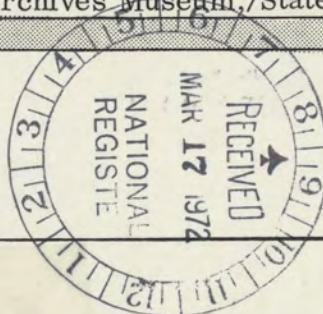

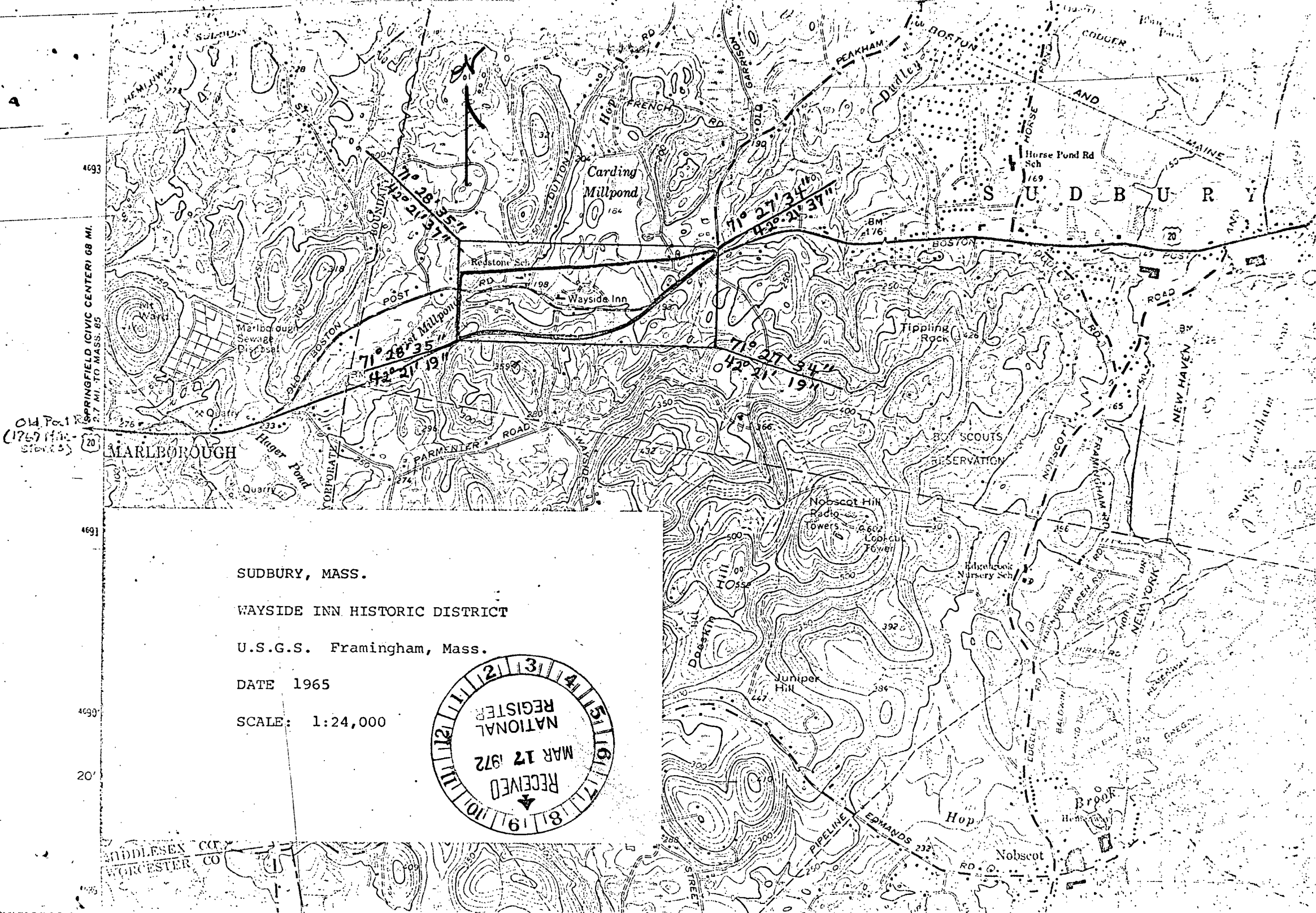

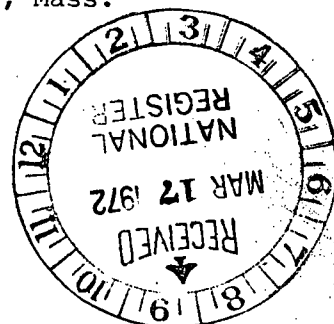
