20. Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings:

The set-back, building material and style of this structure are consistant with other commercial blocks on the street. The large size is especially appropriate to the prominent corner location at intersection with Chestnut Street. Callahan building contributes to the nineteenth century commercial character of Lisbon Street.

DESCRIPTION

21. Other Notable Features of Building and Site, include Interior Features if known:

The facade of this large, flat-roofed, red brick commercial block is divided into three equal sections with ship pilasters rising from above storefront windows and terminating with corbeled brick banding. A corbel table spans the facade at the eaves, surmounted by a projecting brick band embellished with square recessed panels. The projecting wood cornice is supported with brackets.

The fenestration pattern consists of three windows per section at each level. At the second story the center window of each triplet is wider. General window treatment consists of rectangular openings with flush, reticulated, brick, above windows and granite sills. The sizes of openings diminish as floor levels increase.

An inset granite panel, centered above thet hird story windows exhibits relief ornamentation depicting the name "Callahan".

Original storefront elements include cast iron square pilasters with paneled shafts and articulated bases and capitals. Pilasters support an iron lintel embellished with a simple geometric ornament. The lintel is topped by a projecting crown.

- 25. Historical and Architectural Importance: This large red brick commercial block contributes to the nineteenth century character of Lisbon Street. It was designed by Lewiston architect G.M. Coombs, during the period subsequent to his partnership with Stevens, and prior to formal partnership with Gibbs and Wilkenson, although Gibbs was in the office by that time (see separate notes on Coombs). There are many examples of Coombs' work in and around Lisbon Street, including Odd Fellows Hall, the Clifford Block, and the block immediately south,

The structure was built for T.F. and Eugene A. Callahan, partners in T.F. Callahan Co., retailers of trunks, hats and gents furnishings. The business is listed in the City Directory at 276-290 Lisbon Street from 1883.

DESCRIPTION

- 7a. Architectural style: Renaissance
- 7b. Briefly describe the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:

This four story brick building has square headed windows and a flat roof with a shallow projecting cornice. With two distinct elevations on Chestnut (north) and Lisbon (west) streets, the buildings design mirrors the older College Block to the north. The first story shop fronts are divided between cast iron pilasters with modern metal and plate glass shopfronts. Brick pilasters supporting a full entablature provide the principal decorative feature of the building. The original windows have all been replaced with alumninum combination sash.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.)

The historical importance of this building is in conjunction with its neighbor to the south as part of a large development undertaken by the Callahan brothers. T.F. and Eugene Callahan were dealers in trunks, hats, and gents furnishings and their success can be measured in the construction of this building in 1892, and in the adjoining structure in 1910-11. Both are large four story brick buildings with Renaissance inspired styling. The first Callahan Block was designed by George Coombs, an important architect who had the largest practice in western Maine. Coomb's death in 1909 left his son and partner, Eugene Gibbs, to design the second Callahan Block.
