Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The West Main Street Historic District (Boundary Increase), Westborough, Massachusetts, includes twenty properties that line West Main Street just west of the existing historic district. Of the thirty-eight ~~properties~~ buildings, twenty-four are contributing elements to the district. Fourteen are designated noncontributing due to age.

All of the structures within the extension area are single-family residences, representing the eighteenth, nineteenth, and early twentieth centuries. As in the existing district, a variety of architectural styles are represented here, including Georgian, Federal, Greek Revival, and Queen Anne. In addition to several fine examples of wood-frame dwellings, the area includes a mid-nineteenth century brick house. All of the buildings continue to function as single-family residences. North, south, and west of the extension area are modern residential developments.

Outbuildings within the district include a variety of types, ranging from large barns to small sheds and modern garages. Some of the barns appear to be as early as the mid-nineteenth century (see district data sheet for locations of outbuildings).

Lying directly west of the existing historic district, the extension area is composed of lots ranging in size from approximately 4,000 square feet to more than an acre. A number of these lots are subdivisions of former agricultural parcels. Houses in the extension area have a relatively uniform setback and are well-landscaped. An impressive stone wall lines much of the north side of West Main Street.

The extension area is noteworthy for the significant number of eighteenth and early nineteenth century buildings it contains; eight of the twenty-four contributing buildings were constructed before 1800 and eleven were built before 1850. This concentration of early structures is consistent with the pattern of development in the existing district, as the earliest extant structures that stand along West Main Street.

The two earliest houses in the area, 115 West Main Street (ca. 1713/ca. 1830, MHC #63) and 108 West Main Street (1732, MHC #73), are vernacular in design

and follow the traditional five-bay, center-entry plan. Although both have been updated over time, they retain the overall simplicity that is characteristic of early eighteenth century dwellings. The extension area contains an excellent example of an eighteenth century saltbox at 106 West Main Street (1739, MHC #61). Its center entry has a Federal-style surround with partial sidelights set on panelled aprons. Its five-bay facade, steep-sloping south roof plane, and broad proportions are characteristic of this house type.

Among the houses in the extension area are two examples of the Georgian style, 99 West Main Street (ca. 1750, MHC #59) and 110 West Main Street (ca. 1740, MHC #89). The former is a particularly handsome example with double chimneys, a broad gable roof, and a center entry flanked by pilasters supporting a projecting entablature. The latter exhibits Georgian elements in its five-bay facade, symmetrical fenestration, narrow cornerboards, and entry surround with pilasters and entablature.

There are two notable houses in the extension area designed in the Federal style. The house at 105 West Main Street (1790, MHC #72) has been well-preserved and has a fanlight and sidelights framing the main entry; windows are topped by pedimented heads. The Federal-style house at 89 West Main Street (ca. 1800, MHC #57) has the characteristic hip roof and square plan used in high-style Federal design. The main entry is flanked by sidelights set on panelled aprons and is sheltered by a small porch supported on Tuscan columns.

One brick building stands in the extension area at 114 West Main Street (1832, MHC #62). Its side-hall entry and pedimented gable are typical of Greek Revival-style residences. Another house designed in the Greek Revival style is at 102 West Main Street (ca. 1840, MHC #60). Characteristic elements of the style include the end gable with shallow returns, wide-panelled cornerboards, and side-hall entry with full sidelights and heavy entablature.

One of the more interesting houses in the extension area is at 104 West Main Street (1881). The main block of the house was built in 1881 and the four Ionic columns, taken from a house in Worcester, were added to the facade in the 1950s. Two other late-nineteenth century houses stand in the extension area, 118 West Main Street (ca. 1890, MHC #118) and 87 West Main Street (1899, MHC #206). Both were designed in the Queen Anne style and retain significant architectural features common to houses of this style. The former is dominated by a square tower with half timbering and has cross gables decorated with vergeboards, a two-story bay window, and a porch extending across the facade. The house at 87 West Main Street has a broad porch, two-story bay window, large gabled dormer, and eyebrow dormers.

Noncontributing buildings within the district include four residences (83, 85,

100 and 101 West Main Streets). These are all small wood dwellings built in the mid-twentieth century on land that had been subdivided from neighboring parcels. These houses are all typical of that period. One notable loss within the extension area is a late-nineteenth century estate that stood at 98 West Main Street, where the public school now stands. It was removed in the mid-twentieth century when the town needed a site for the new school.

Archaeological Description

While no prehistoric sites are currently recorded in the district extension, it is possible that sites are present. Eight known prehistoric sites are recorded in the general area (within one mile). This factor and the location of the district near several unnamed streams and ponds indicates a potential for locating prehistoric sites. In general, however, the potential for locating significant prehistoric archaeological survivals is low because of historic period development in the district.

A potential may exist for locating significant historical archaeological remains in the district. Controlled testing and excavation can help locate 18th and 19th century structural remains and occupational-related features (trash pits, privies, wells) associated with present structures and those no longer extant. A moderate potential exists for locating significant historic period survivals.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The West Main Street Historic District (Boundary Increase), Westborough, Massachusetts, is significant, and consistent with the existing district, for its association with Westborough's development from an agricultural community to a diversified manufacturing town. In addition, the extension area contains well-preserved examples of a variety of architectural styles, including Georgian, Federal, Greek Revival and Queen Anne. The area is notable for its concentration of eighteenth century dwellings, which represent the town's earliest development. The extension area is significant on the local level and meets Criteria A and C and Exception B for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

The town of Westborough was originally part of a large Marlborough land grant given to Charles Chauncy in 1659. The first area of settlement was established near Chauncy Lake along the native trail that was later to become the Boston and Worcester Turnpike (Route 9). As early as 1688, residents began agitating for independence from Marlborough, and by 1717 "Chauncy Village" was incorporated. By 1724, a meetinghouse had been established off Milk Street near Lyman Street, then the area of densest settlement. Throughout the next century the town expanded through a series of annexations--land was acquired from Sutton in 1728, from Shrewsbury in 1762, from Upton in 1763, and from Northborough in 1766--until it reached its present area of 21 1/2 square miles in 1793. Colonial Westborough was characterized primarily by dispersed agricultural settlements with a small cluster of houses on Lyman Street near Lake Chauncy and a cemetery (The Old Burying Ground), and a few houses and taverns along the main route from southern New England to Boston (now known as Main Street). By 1749, the town's expansion necessitated the relocation of the meetinghouse from Lyman Street closer to Westborough's geographic center at the crossroads of Milk and Main Streets.¹

Prior to the coming of the railroad, into the 1820s and 1830s, the character of West Main Street remained typical of many of the neighboring towns, with

large land parcels and modest houses. Records of the specific "occupations" of the area residents are scant. Generally, inventories and tax valuations of the period include itemization of horses, cows, various farm equipment, and farm-related outbuildings, and Westborough probably followed this pattern. The lot sizes and house designs are typical of the eighteenth century agrarian properties. Once manufacturing came to dominate the economic base and agriculture diminished, residential properties required less land and the farms began to sell off portions of their property. Typically, as the former farm properties changed hands, the large lots were subdivided.

The only structure in the extension area not originally constructed as a residence is the Blue Anchor Tavern at 108 West Main Street (1732). The tavern was originally located approximately 700 feet to the east of its current site. The tavern was built in 1732 by innkeepers Abner and Vashti Newton to replace a smaller tavern on the site. In addition to serving the early travelers bound for Boston, the inn was host to a number of important figures of the Revolutionary War, including General Israel Putnam, General Benedict Arnold, Colonel Pitkin with his Hartford Boys, and General Henry Knox. The tavern was moved in 1820 because Major Jonathan Fayerweather, owner at the time, wanted to build a new and grander house on the site.

Several of the families who played important roles in the history of Westborough and who are significant for their associations with the town's development are represented in the district extension area. The house at 115 West Main Street (ca. 1713) was occupied by Thomas Rice, one of the earliest settlers of Westborough. Rice was the town's first selectman and town treasurer. In addition, he served as a lieutenant in the French and Indian Wars and was a representative to the General Court from 1715 to 1716. Two houses in the area were built by Charles Rice, son of Thomas Rice. By 1711, Charles Rice had built a house at 102 West Main Street; although the main block dates from ca. 1840, it is believed that the rear ell may be part of an earlier dwelling. Charles Rice fought in the French and Indian Wars and served as selectman in 1726. Charles Rice is also believed to have built the house at 99 West Main Street (ca. 1750).

The house at 105 West Main Street (1790) was the home of Elihu and Elizabeth Whitney Blake, sister of cotton gin-inventor Eli Whitney. The Blake's son, Eli Whitney Blake, was born in this house and was an inventor of note himself. He was responsible for the Blake Stone Crusher, invented in 1858, which revolutionized road building and mining. He is also known for having founded the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences. Nephews of Eli Whitney Blake owned the house at 89 West Main Street (ca. 1800) in the 1850s, although the house was built earlier for Phineas Gleason. The Whitney family had also been early residents of Westborough Center. The house at 106 West Central Street (1739) was the home of Nathan Whitney, grandfather of Eli Whitney.

In the 1830s and 1840s, Westborough Center enjoyed expanded prosperity, largely due to the coming of the railroad. The railroad played a crucial role in the transformation of Westborough from an agrarian community to a prosperous manufacturing town. This industrial and commercial development was further fueled by technological advancements in the second half of the nineteenth century. The nineteenth century prosperity of the area is reflected in the residential stock along West Main Street. The town's prominent businessmen were quick to build themselves substantial houses, a number of which are in the district extension area. At 114 West Main Street (1832) is the Lyman Belknap House. Belknap's father, John, was one of Westborough's most prosperous farmers at the turn of the nineteenth century. Lyman Belknap operated a market and also sold meat and produce at Quincy Market in Boston. Eventually, he opened a produce and commission house in Boston. He was active locally, being a deacon of the church, holding several town offices, and assisting in operations of the Reform School. In ca. 1890 Belknap built the larger, more grand, Queen Anne-style house at 118 West Main Street. Another of the town's prominent citizens, Reuben Boynton, lived in the district extension area at 104 West Main Street (1881). Boynton, a successful merchant, contributed to town affairs as well, acting as a selectman from 1880 to 1882, water commissioner in 1873, and as state representative in 1865, 1874, and 1875. Boynton was responsible for construction of the Boynton Block (West Main Street, 1868), where he operated his market on the street level. (As meat had previously been sold only in basements or "butcher's carts" in the Square, this created considerable comment.) Another Queen Anne-style house, 87 West Main Street (1899), was built for Forest W. Forbes, the son and business associate of local sleigh maker D. W. Forbes. These two men were responsible for construction of the American Block (West Main Street) where they manufactured their sleighs. They were among the largest and oldest manufacturers of the kind.

In addition to having important historical associations with the town of Westborough, the West Main Street Historic District Extension area attains architectural significance for its rare concentration of well-preserved, architecturally distinguished buildings. The extension area includes excellent examples of Georgian (110 and 99 West Main Street), Federal (105 and 89 West Main Street), Greek Revival (102 and 114 West Main Street), and Queen Anne (118 and 87 West Main Street) style residences.

Verbal Boundary Description

The West Main Street Historic District Extension includes all those properties fronting West Main Street between Blake Street and West End Avenue excluding the Westborough High School property which is a four acre parcel containing a modern school building. A line of convenience crosses the High School property.

Boundary Justification

The boundaries of the West Main Street Historic District Extension were drawn to include a group of eighteenth, nineteenth and early twentieth century residences that line West Main Street just west of the existing historic district. These structures were excluded from the original nomination because of financial constraints. Together with the existing district, this group of buildings represents Westborough's development from an agrarian community to a prosperous manufacturing town. It is consistent in historical association and physical characteristics with the existing district. Although two mid-twentieth century houses stand at the easternmost end of the extension area, the historic character of the streetscape is preserved.

The boundaries were drawn to exclude modern housing developments to the north and south of the extension area. West of the extension area is a golf course, formerly a farm, and residences, most dating from the twentieth century. Southeast of the extension area is a large residential area that has yet to be inventoried. An initial windshield survey of the area found most of the houses dating from the late nineteenth century, with scattered examples from the late eighteenth and early twentieth centuries. Historically, development in this area seems to relate more directly to the industrial development that occurred east and south of the existing historic district. It appears that there may be a separate district in this area; this will be determined once the inventory has been undertaken there.

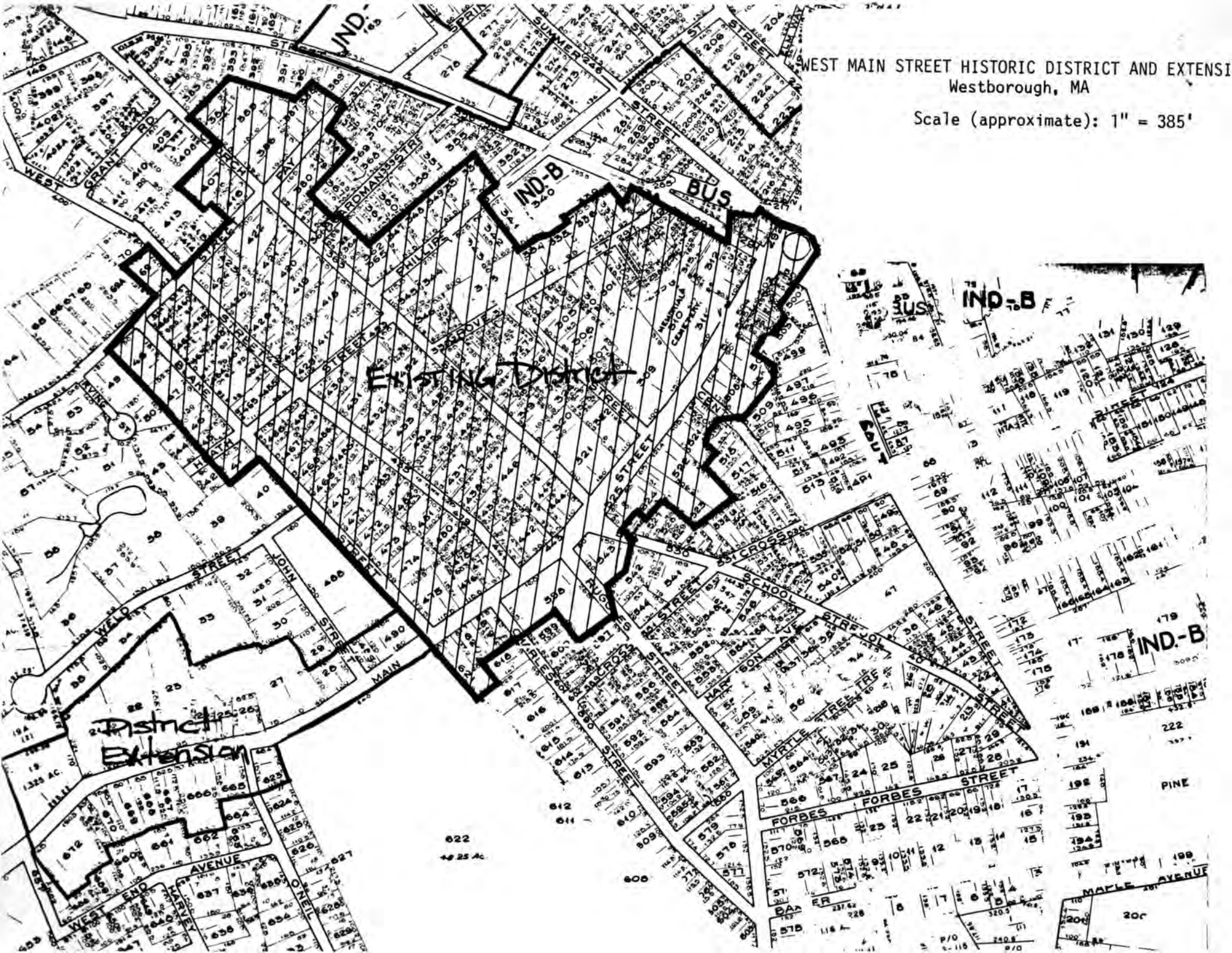

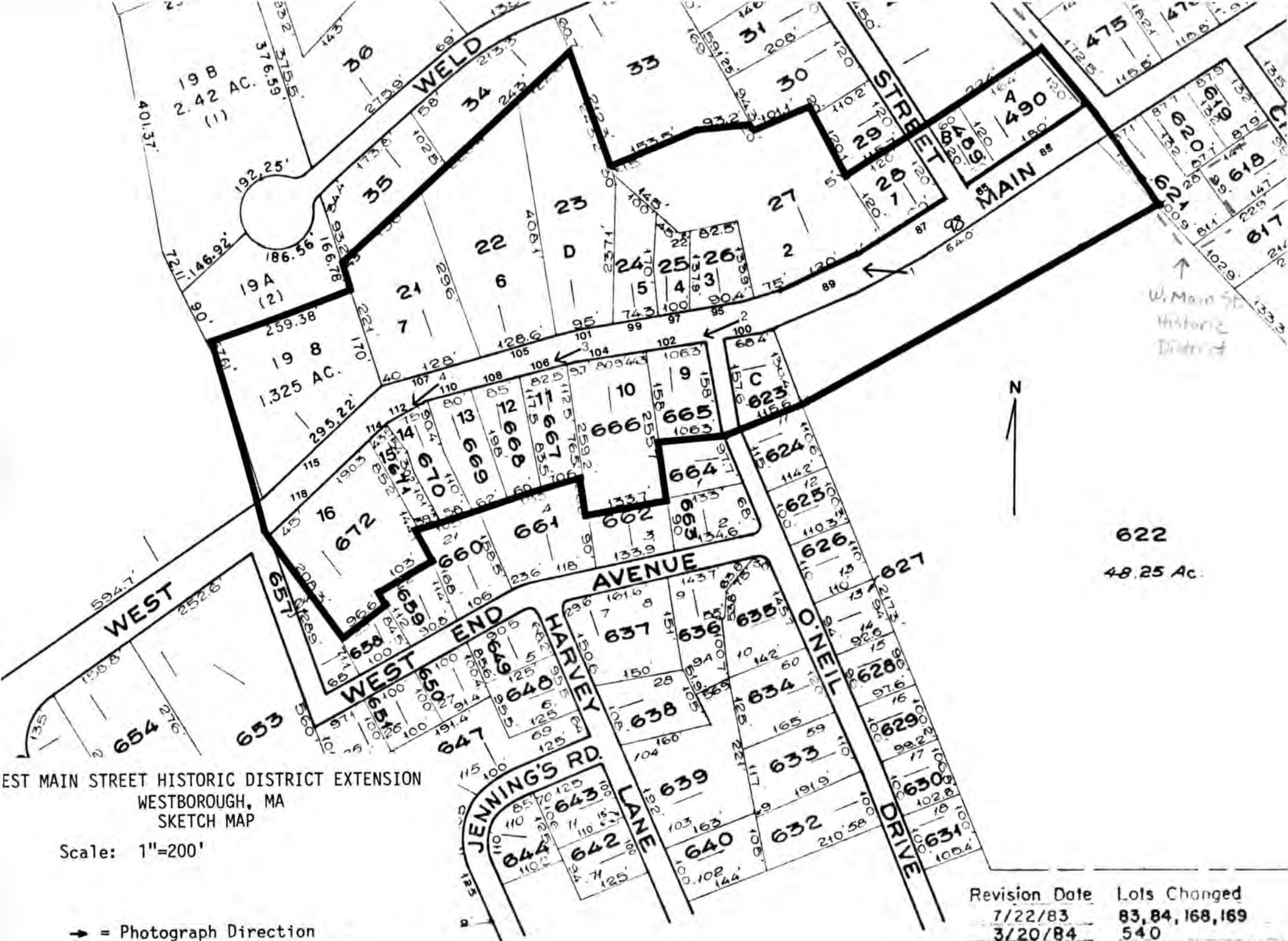

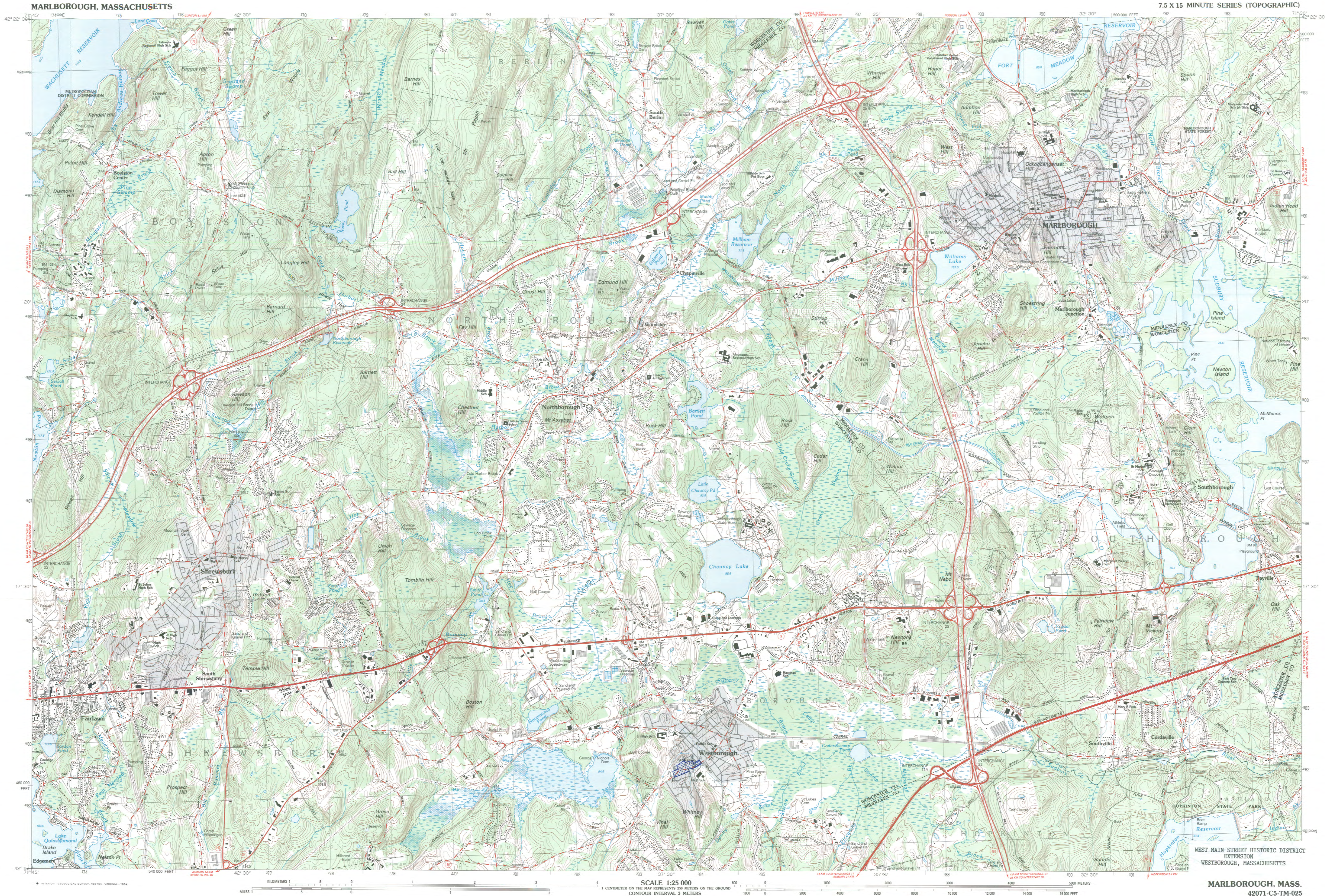
