DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Edward C. Elliott House is rectangular in plan with the length being but slightly in excess of the width. A rectangular porch is located on the east side of the house and is presently enclosed and used as a sun room. The porch of the second floor is five sided and thus gives the appearance of a partial octagon in plan. This also is now enclosed as a studio. Modest dormers are located on either end and in the rear of a low pitched roof with generous overhangs. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles although it is very likely that it was originally covered with cedar shingles.

The exterior walls are all stucco on a wood frame and the front and rear walls extend at either end in a battered configuration. This is not at all unlike other George W. Maher designs in the Chicago area. A horizontal emphasis is given to the house by a dark painted wood belt course that surrounds the house at the second floor windowsill height. Additional horizontal trim is evenly spaced and surrounds the house between the wood belt course and the roof soffit. It is painted the light sand color of the walls and casts shadows providing an additional horizontal emphasis. A planter box is placed beneath the center windows, again emphasizing the horizontal elements, a design theme common to the Prairie School.

Like many of George W. Maher's designs, the entrance is an important design element. A graceful segmental arch roof with short flat wings shelters the door and is supported on strong wooden cantilevered beams. These, in turn, project from battered pilasters at either side of the entrance. Leaded glass window sidelights in lilac pattern are on either side of the entrance door and a similar design pattern is found in the glazing of the second floor windows directly over the entrance. Windows in the rear at the stair landing of the house bear a similar handsome glass pattern. This design retains all of its original beauty.

The interior has seen only minimal alterations during its life. The original woodwork is intact and a handsome barrel vaulted ceiling in the front entrance hall remains, reflecting the hood at the front entrance. A large brick fireplace is on the east wall of the living room and its design also has the battered side wall effect of the exterior.

The house is very similar to George W. Maher's home for Henry W. Schultz , 19 Warwick Road, Winnetka, Illinois, of 1907.¹ Variations do occur: the horizontal belt course and the horizontal trim members do not appear on the Schultz House but rather the horizontal emphasis of the second floor is obtained through the use of group windows and a much longer horizontal planting box. Other similarities can be found in the Frank G. Ely residence, 305 Kennilworth Road, Kennilworth, Illinois also by George W. Maher of 1910.

The house is an excellent example of the "compact cubical" type of the Prairie School style of architecture, a popular form. The house is located next door to Frank Lloyd Wright's Eugene Gilmore House and two blocks from Louis H. Sullivan's Harold C. Bradley House, creating a cluster of three excellent Prairie School designs by three significant architects of the period.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Edward C. Elliott House is important in that it represents the work of a nationally prominent architect, George W. Maher, and possess high architectural values.

While the attribution of the architect cannot be established through building permits or existing drawings, records in the Account Journal of the original owners indicate payments to Architect George W. Maher during the time of design of this house. The Madison architectural firm of Claude and Starck evidently was retained by the owners to fulfill the need for on-site supervision of the project.² Additional correspondence with the family has indicated strong friendships existed with families whose roots were in the Winnetka area and who were most likely familiar with the work of George W. Maher.

George W. Maher (1864-1926) has been cited by H. Allen Brooks as one of the most significant architects of his time, perhaps as influential as Frank Lloyd Wright.³ Maher had established his own practice in Chicago in 1888, a time when Wright was still with Louis H. Sullivan. Maher, Wright and Elmslie had all worked in the office of Joseph Lyman Silsbee, also in Chicago, prior to moving into Sullivan's office, or in Maher's case, establishing his own architectural practice. Maher was remarkable in that his formal education extended only to the eighth grade. He developed as a capable practitioner and a frequent contributor to the <u>Western Architect</u>. His published articles were not self-laudatory discussions of his own work but rather passionate pleas for his colleagues to abandon architectural forms that were mimics of the past and instead to seek new forms representative of a "democratic" nation. In this way his voice was similar to that of Sullivan's writings in such important essays as his "Kindergarten Chats." A few buildings designed by George W. Maher exist in the state of Wisconsin and the Edward C. Elliott House is the only known example in Madison. It stands as one of the most significant examples of Prairie School architecture within the community.
