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#### DESCRIPTION

The 1901 Art Building is a one-story octagonal wood frame structure located on the Arkansas Valley Fairgrounds in, Rocky Ford, Otero County. Now commonly referred to as the Arts and Flower Building, the structure is 300 feet in circumference and contains approximately 2,152 square feet. The building sits on a single row of cement blocks that rest on a concrete footer. Exterior and interior walls are lapsiding. The low pitched, concave, hipped roof was originally covered with wood shingles. They were replaced with asphalt shingles in 1990. The eaves are boxed, and there is a vent at the roof's peak.

A row of five wood framed windows, most of which have four lights, is located just below the eaves on four of the eight sides. The second and fourth windows in each row are hinged at the top and swing inward for ventilation. An evaporative cooler was installed in the third window on the east wall circa 1980. On the exterior, as a security measure, heavy mesh screening has been stapled over the windows. On the north wall, there are double wooden entry doors located below the central 6 light window. Another double door is located on the south wall. A decorative sign, installed at an unknown date, with the words "Flowers" and "Needlework" is located above the entry doors.

The building maintains a high degree of integrity. It has experienced few changes and remains essentially as constructed in 1901. Circa World War II buildings to its east and west have housed local 4-H and school district functions as well as uses associated with the Otero County Fair. Over the years, maintenance to the Art Building has primarily consisted of exterior and interior painting and window repairs. At an unknown date, brick planters were installed on either side of the entry doors. Recent maintenance and improvements to the building have been provided through the fundraising efforts of the Rocky Ford Garden Club and the City of Rocky Ford. In 1990, a ramp with a metal railing was added at the north entry in order to provide access for handicapped visitors to the Fair. At that time, the three sides of the building that face the midway were scraped and painted off-white with medium brown trim. In 1991, the remaining exterior walls were scraped and painted to match. In 1994, the entry doors were repaired and painted.

On the interior, the original narrow tongue and groove ceiling was repaired by city workers in 1992. Care was taken to blend any new material into the original. A ring of chamfered wood columns contributes to the roof's support, along with a square section wood column centered under the roof's peak. The ceiling is painted white as are the walls and wood columns. The wooden display shelves that surrounded the building are a soft, cool turquoise. Although some shelves have been added over the years, much of the shelving is original. In 1994, a new plywood floor was installed. It is painted gray.

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## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Art Building, the oldest building on the fairgrounds, is significant under Criterion "A" for its long term association with the popular Arkansas Valley Fair, an annual event important to the social history of the surrounding area. The fair is among the earliest of the many fall festivals that were held in Colorado communities. Such events served to bring community members together and were promoted as a means of bringing tourists into an area. For more than a century, the Arkansas Valley Fair has been an Otero County tradition. Since its construction in 1901, the Art Building has played a significant part in the continuing success of the fair.

The Art Building is also significant under Criterion "C" as a well-preserved example of a structure constructed in the Octagon Mode, a building type that enjoyed some popularity during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Although somewhat of a curiosity, the type was promoted for residential use by Orson Squire Fowler in his 1854 publication <u>The Octagon House: A Home for All</u>. Octagons were also constructed to serve as barns. As in the case of the Art Building, they also proved to be quite functional as exhibition halls. With its open floor plan, high ceiling, and large windows that provide natural light and ventilation, the Art Building has successfully accommodated the wide variety of art work and flowers displayed in the building each year during the Arkansas Valley Fair. Over the years, the building has experienced very few modifications and provides a sense of visual continuity for those attending the fair.

The building has always been a great drawing card, a place where young and old alike delight in viewing the beautiful handmade articles created by local artisans that are displayed there each year. During its first year as an exhibition hall dedicated to properly showcasing local artistic talent, a local newspaper article stated that "those who formerly thought that the handiwork of women amounted to little, have reason to think otherwise." Currently, many talented people throughout the Arkansas Valley continue to enter their paintings, needlework, sculptures, crafts, and floral arrangements. Almost everyone knows someone who has an entry on display, and this familiar octagonal building remains a popular place to meet old friends year after year.

## Early Development of the Arkansas Valley Fair

George W. Swink, a two term State Senator, was the Father of Watermelon Day and founder of the Arkansas Valley Fair. Born in 1836 in Breckenridge County, Kentucky, Swink came to Rocky Ford from Illinois in 1871 and engaged in the mercantile and stock business. In 1875, Swink began experimenting with raising agricultural crops, particularly the vine crops. The first Watermelon Day was held in front of Swink's place of business in 1878 with only about twenty-five people from the thinly settled county participating.

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By 1888, approximately 1,500 attended Watermelon Day and enjoyed helping themselves to free melon from the Watermelon Pile. For several years the Watermelon Pile was located near the train depot. By 1891, Watermelon Day had evolved into a much larger annual event, and the Arkansas Valley Fair Association was formed in 1892. Swink was elected President, and held the position until his death. For many years, the Watermelon Pile has been located just across the midway from the Art Building. Swink is credited with donating the funds needed to install the building's original tongue and groove ceiling and to paint it so that it would be ready for use during the 1901 Fair. **United States Department of the Interior** National Park Service


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## SKETCH MAP
