Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Summary

This site, which has two historic lookout trees, is located on a ridge between Bear and Wall Lakes overlooking Demotte Park to the east and the Tipover, Big Spring and Kanabonits drainages to the south and west. It is on the interior of the Kaibab Plateau on the North Kaibab Ranger District, Kaibab National Forest. It is within the mixed conifer forest at an elevation of 9,160 feet. One tree is still alive and standing and the other has fallen. They maintain sufficient integrity to qualify for National Register listing.

Physical Description

The standing lookout tree is a white fir 75 feet high and 3 feet in diameter with a ladder constructed up its eastern side approximately 40 feet. Two contiguous segments of ladder works remain. The first 10-15 feet are gone. The remaining ladder is in good condition. The construction is typical of other ladders on lookout trees: 2" X 4" lumber sidepieces with 1" x 12-14" crosspieces. It is attached to the tree with lag bolts. This tree is associated with a downed lookout tree with a ladder up its side and 6 foot by 6 foot platform in its top. This is the only documented platform tree on the North Kaibab Ranger District.

Setting

Vegetation surrounding the site currently consists of an aspen-spruce-fir community with some grasses and forbs. This area was logged last year (1989) and much debris remains. The entire area is heavily littered with duff and downed vegetation. However, the setting retains much of its historic appearance.

Integrity

The Tipover Lookout tree is still in good condition, despite having been abandoned for approximately 30 years. Only the lower 10-15 feet of ladder has been removed, for safety purposes. It is still readily identifiable as a lookout tree facility. The fallen tree is an integral part of the site. As a whole, this site retains integrity of location, design, feeling, materials, workmanship, setting, and associaton.

Summary

Tipover Lookout Tree is significant under Criterion A [36 CFR 60.6] for its association with 1) the development of forest fire prevention, detection, and control by the USDA Forest Service between 1905 and 1940, and 2) the conservation movement and its influence on public land management from 1905 to 1940. It is also significant under Criterion C [36 CFR 60.6] because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type of construction, the earliest and simplest form of fire detection structure, built into a living tree.

Historic Contexts/Background

The construction and abandonment dates for the Tipover Lookout Tree are presently unknown. They might be ascertained, however, through oral history. This site is unusual because the fallen tree had a platform, a unique feature among lookout trees on the North Kaibab Ranger District. The fact that it was replaced after it had fallen is indicative of this site's importance to the fire detection network of the area.

Although much remains to be learned about the history of this lookout tree, it had an important function in the earliest fire detection network on the Kaibab National Forest. It continues to evoke a sense of the past.
