DESCRIPTION

SUMMARY

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club, located at 118 Sullivan Street in Punta Gorda, Florida, is a one story, Mission style building. Constructed in 1927, it contributes to the Punta Gorda Multiple Property Group under Associated Property Type, Buildings of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930 as an example of the subtype Institutional Architecture.

DESCRIPTIVE STATEMENT

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club, built in 1927, is a one story Mission style building. Rectangular in plan, it has a brick foundation and is constructed of brick with a stucco finish. The lower portion of the side elevations is constructed of molded concrete block. (See photo 1.)

The front elevation has a gable roof fronted by a curvilinear parapet which extends above a flat roof with a plain linear parapet. A shed roof supported by triangular brackets borders the linear parapet. Both the shed roof and the gable roof are covered with asphalt shingles. The windows are 1/1 double hung sash.

The front entrance has three doorways set back in a recessed porch, which has three archways; the middle archway is supported by two small Corinthian columns. Bay windows flank the entrance. A rectangular sign with the inscription "Punta Gorda Woman's Club" hangs above the middle arch. (See photo 2.)

The interior of the building contains the original auditoria space, kitchen, and offices.

ALTERATIONS

The building has undergone no major alterations since it was constructed in 1927. A brick patio and garden were added to the northwest corner of the property in 1969.

SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club is significant at the local level under Criterion A for its historical association with both the state and national woman's club movements. It is significant at the local level under Criterion C as a fine example of Mission style architecture in the City of Punta Gorda. It contributes to the Punta Gorda Multiple Property Group under Associated Historic Context: Exploration, Settlement and Early Development of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930, and Associated Property Type: Buildings of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930. This one story Mission style building is an excellent example of the subtype, Institutional Architecture.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

Woman's clubs were formed in the United States in response to women's desires for intellectual stimulation and out of an awareness of and willingness to meet community needs. Until 1889, such groups were strictly local organizations. The Sorosis Club celebrated its twenty-first anniversary in 1889 by convening a meeting of women's groups from across the country. The result was the creation of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Florida's first such club for women was organized in Green Cove Springs in 1887. The goal of its members, mostly winter residents, was village improvement through the introduction of order and cleanliness, and the provision of a "social centre for intelligent intercourse of women with one another." The group was incorporated in April 1889 as "The Ladies' Improvement Association of Green Cove Springs, Florida." After solving the village's immediate health problems, the club took up other objectives, such as literary pursuits, the creation of parks, and the digging of wells.

Meanwhile, other clubs had been established in Florida and on February 21, 1895, the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs was created in Green Cove Springs. There were six charter members: the clubs in Palmetto, Green Cove Springs, Orange City, Crescent City, Fairfield, and Tarpon Springs. Clubs pursued various activities depending upon their community's needs, but many chose the establishment of libraries as a major project. In 1898, five woman's clubs in Florida had established libraries. Over the years the clubs have contributed greatly to the welfare of their communities in other ways as well, providing cultural activities,

support of the war effort during the World Wars, and ministering to the needs of the poor and disadvantaged and children. The Florida Federation was admitted to the General Federation of Women's Clubs on January 25, 1898, and was incorporated April 12, 1915. The Florida Federation remains an active organization with a membership of over 30,000 women and publishes the quarterly magazine, Florida Clubwoman.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club was organized and federated in 1925 through the consolidation of three local clubs for women: the Fortnightly Club, the Married Ladies Club, and the Woman's Civic Association. Judge William Fenmore Cooper of Cook County, Illinois wintered in Punta Gorda and donated land for a club building. In 1927, a Mission style club house was constructed at 118 Sullivan Street. By 1929, the club had 105 members. Membership declined during the Great Depression, and by 1936 the club had only 50 members. Today the club has a membership of 86.

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club has undertaken numerous civic projects since it was organized in 1925. The club collected clothing for victims of the 1928 hurricane, raised funds for undernourished children in the WPA nursery, and entertained service personnel during World War II, among other projects. In addition, the club allowed other organizations to hold meetings and functions in the club building. Like many woman's clubs in Florida, the Punta Gorda Woman's Club started the community's first library. During the 1930s, books were collected and lent out to the public in a room of the club building. By 1951, the library contained over 5000 books. In the late 1950s, the club raised funds for a library building. Located on Retta Esplanade, it was operated by the Woman's Club until it was turned over to the Charlotte County Library System.

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club building is historically significant as the site of the first community library in Punta Gorda. It is also significant as the meeting place for the Punta Gorda Woman's Club, an organization which helped shape the Punta Gorda community through its many service projects.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Punta Gorda Woman's Club, built in 1927, is a one story Mission style building with a curvilinear parapet and an arched entryway on the front elevation. The Mission style is a more

simple form of the Mediterranean Revival style. Derived more from the early Spanish missions than the romantic eclecticism of southern Europe, Mission style buildings are usually simple designs with stucco walls, flat roofs with curvilinear parapets, and arched loggias or patios. The Punta Gorda Woman's Club is architecturally significant as a fine example of Mission style architecture in an institutional building in the City of Punta Gorda.
