Describe present and historic physical appearance.

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#### **Description**

The William H. Lightle House is single story, wood frame residence designed in a vernacular interpretation of the Italianate style. It is composed of a variety of gabled and hipped elements which combine to form a roughly rectangular plan with the exception of the gable roof enclosed porch and carport which projects from the west elevation. Two brick chimneys, now painted white, punctuate the roofline: one to the east, just inside from the gable end, and the other toward the center, to the east of the intersection of the northern or front side gable with the front gable end. The entire structure is covered with composition shingles, sheathed in weatherboard with decorative wood trim, and supported by a brick foundation.

The northern or front elevation is composed of an eastern side gable section with a recessed porch, a central front gable, and a western side gable enclosed porch and carport. The eastern side gable section is fenestrated with two arched two-over-two double-hung wood sash windows, which are decorated with large, flanged decorative crowns which accentuate the arched shape of the window below. The crowns are ornamented with two central acorn decorations, one above the other, and one at each springpoint below. Each window retains a pair of shutters, painted black. The entrance beneath the porch consists of a single panelled door surrounded by thin, arched half-sidelights with small wood panels below and a single-pane, horizontal, arched transom window. Outlining the entire composition and decorating the principal elements within are delicate rope moldings of various dimensions, each appropriate in size to that element which it adorns. Decorative acom pendants are attached to the entrance facings at the upper corners. The recessed porch, which alters the slope of the roofline somewhat, is supported on four box columns each of which is decorated with molded capitals and a decorative, wood panelled and molded pedestal base. The central gable end is relieved by a single central arched window, containing two-over-two, double-hung wood sash, and decorated with a flaring, molded decorative crown identical to those seen under the recessed porch. The recent gabled porch and carport to the west is lighted with full-height aluminum windows and sliding doors and supported on simple box columns.

The western elevation is relieved by one two-over-two, double-hung arched wood sash window to the north, a row of full-height aluminum windows and entrance in the central porch (beneath the carport), and one six-over-six wood sash window followed by a pair of six-over-six wood sash windows at the southern end of the main section of the house. A single six-over-six wood sash window lights the hipped roof shed at the back of the house. The eastern elevation is fenestrated with three two-over-two arched wood sash windows to the north (two placed symmetrically in the gable end) and a single six-over-six wood sash window to the south. The wall of the enclosed rear shed is blank.

The southern elevation consists of the carport and enclosed porch to the west, a pair of six-over-six wood sash windows in the central hipped shed, and a single six-over-six wood sash window in the lower shed to the east.

The interior features specially crafted mantels which, like the arched windows, were shipped from St. Louis. The front entrance opens into an eleven-foot wide hallway which originally led to a rear entrance and breezeway which connected the main part of the house with the detached kitchen and dining room (these have long since disappeared, though the well remains). Apart from these missing

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elements and the obviously newer additions to the structure, the house has suffered no significant alterations.

The William H. Lightle House is in very good condition.

9. Major Bibliographical References

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#### Significance

The William H. Lightle House (Part E, Historic Context #3) is significant as one of the last manifestations of the Italianate style in the county and one of the most unusual. Its exaggerated and dramatic flaring arched window crowns lend a mannered quality to this otherwise common house design. The unique design of the window crowns, and the fact that no other buildings in Searcy or White County have any decoration which could be considered similar, reveals their St. Louis origin. They, like the interior fireplace mantels, were ordered from that city and installed in the house.

This residence was constructed for his family by William H. Lightle, a prominent Searcy businessman and banker. Lightle began his business career in Searcy in 1881 as one of the directors of the Searcy Banking and Insurance Company, which started with a capital stock of \$25,000. By 1887 an investment firm doing business as the Hicks, Lightle and Company had purchased the Searcy West Point Railroad (a small and dilapidated connector line which both connected Searcy with West Point, the closest point on the Little Red River, and with the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern Railroad) and proceeded to improve it substantially. By this time Lightle had also purchased a rock crusher for the purpose of providing a proper roadbed for this rail line. In the meantime Lightle operated a mercantile business in Searcy with his brother, J.E. Lightle, a concern which they sold at a considerable profit in 1890. Lightle was later one of the founders of the Peoples Bank of Searcy, which opened in 1904, and by 1909 he became the president of another new bank, the Union Bank and Trust Company. He remained in this office until his death in 1922.
