Hawthorne is located on the old Greensboro Road, lying approximately a quarter of a mile north of old U. S. Highway 80 (State Route 8) and the community of Prairieville. The property is approximately 6 miles east of Demopolis and 12 miles west of Uniontown. The plantation house faces the remnants of the old Greensboro Road which was abandoned after the construction of State Highway 69 approximately a half mile due east. The approach to the dwelling is from the south, following the former road bed which is now a long entrance drive. The main house at Hawthorne plantation is the last remaining example of the Italian villa style in Hale County and one of the few structures reflecting an Italianate influence in the Canebrake region of Alabama.

A house was constructed on the Hawthorne plantation by the J. R. Manning family in the 1830s. Circa 1865, Dr. James Browder purchased the property from the Manning family and had a local planter, artist, and architect, J. W. Tayloe, remodel the structure into an Italian villa. Tayloe obviously selected the plan and elevation of Samuel Sloan's design for "A Southern House" which appeared in the widely distributed pattern book, The Model Architect. As with the Sloan design, the main house at Hawthorne features an asymmetrical facade, consisting of a two story block with a flanking (to the north) one story ell. The two story block is three bays wide while the ell is also three bays wide. A tall tower capped by a pyramidal roof and a wooden spire is located at the juncture of the gable roofed two story block and the side ell. The main block contains a side hall plan, with a stair hall with double rooms sharing a central chimney lying to the south. This plan is repeated upstairs. The side ell contains a large dining room and a bedroom. Reputedly, this ell is part of the original Manning home. Entrance to the main house is through an arched opening at the base of the tower. The doorway immediately to the left opens into the stairhall while the door lying directly behind the arch, opens into the dining room. A one story porch supported by chamfered posts wraps around the two story block while a one story shed roof porch fronts the dining ell. Access to the one story porch is through the arched opening at the base of the tower. The windows on the first floor of the two story block are actually a series of French doors which open onto the wraparound porch. Italianate detailing is evident in the brackets along the eaves of the porch and the main roofline of the two story wing. The French doors also feature Italianate styled door surrounds. Devoid of detailing is the one story ell which further suggests that the wing predates the rest of the house. Detailing throughout the interior of the house is simple, reeded or plain moldings with plain or bullseye cornerblocks found on most doorways. The original mantles are also simple in design.

A single leaf entrance with full transom and sidelights originally opened onto a rear porch. Today, a bathroom and kitchen addition has been added to the rear of the structure, lying south of the original porch. Bathrooms have been added adjacent to the bedroom contained in the ell and at the rear of the upstairs hall. Portions of the house have been covered with aluminum siding including the centrally placed tower. The tower originally contained stained glass windows which were removed as was the small stairway which allowed access to the tower observatory.

Located on the Hawthorne property are three contributing outbuildings, two storage sheds of simple design and a building used by Dr. James Browder as his medical office. It is believed that all three outbuildings date from 1863. The office has a side gable roof and a two bay facade. The exterior wall material is weatherboard and the windows are 6/6 double hung sash. The structure is now used for storage. Also located on the grounds is a deteriorated modern shed.

The main house at Hawthorne retains much of its original design, materials, craftsmanship, workmanship and feeling and a high degree of its original components and stylistic detailing. While the structure has undergone some changes it still retains a high degree of architectural and historical significance as the last remaining example of the Italian villa style. The Hawthorne nomination includes one non-contributing and four contributing resources.

Criterion C: Architecture

The Hawthorne plantation house is a significant example of a Canebrake plantation house in the Italian villa style, the last remaining example of that style in Hale County and one of the few structures featuring Italianate detailing in the Canebrake. The plantation house yields information regarding the styles, forms, construction methods, techniques and craftsmanship utilized by the residents of the Canebrake from 1830-1942. Too, the plantation house reflects the use and adaptation of pattern books by residents of the area in the construction of residences and structures. The main house at Hawthorne retains a high degree of integrity in regard to design, materials, workmanship, feeling and setting.

Historical Summary:

In 1834, Dr. James Manning purchased 2,500 acres in the former lands of the Vine and Olive colony, including the tract of land which became Hawthorne plantation located in Township 18 Range 4 East of present day Hale County. Manning, a native of New Jersey, continued to live in Madison County, Alabama sending his son, James, Jr., to the lands near the settlement of Prairieville. James Manning, Jr. began construction of his plantation dwelling in 1835. The Mannings were a prominent Canebrake family; by 1860, all of the plantation lands belonging to the estate of Dr. James Manning were worth \$170,000 and the estate contained 154 slaves. The Hawthorne plantation remained in the Manning family until 1864 when James Manning, Jr. sold the plantation to Dr. James Browder, a native of Dinwiddie County, Virginia. According to family sources, Dr. Browder engaged local planter, artist and architect, J. W. Tayloe to remodel the structure. Browder and Tayloe selected the Italian villa style for the renovation and probably utilized the plan for "A Southern House" included in The Model Architect. a pattern book which included the works of Samuel Sloan. Interestingly, Sloan's partner, Stewart, was working in Alabama prior to 1860 and Hawthorne bears a marked resemblance to the Battle-De Graffenreid house (demolished) in Tuscaloosa which has been attributed to Stewart. James Browder was a popular local doctor and his medical office is located on the property at the rear of the dwelling. The house remained in the Browder family until it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Davis in the 1960s. Mrs. Davis is the owner of the property at the present. 1

Archaeological Potential

Although no formal archaeological survey has been made at the Hawthorne plantation, the potential for subsurface remains may be high. Properties of this type were sited with a constellation of dependencies such as kitchens and other outbuildings. Buried portions may contain significant information that may be useful in interpreting the entire property.
