GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This is a 2-1/2 story, frame, single-family dwelling. It features a complex roof consisting of intersecting steeply-pitched gables, 1/1 double-hung sash windows, 1-story bay window on the east elevation, and wrap-around full-width facade porch with gable-end entryway supported by wood columns. A massive brick chimney stands near the rear of the roof.

House

The main block of the Johnson House measures approximately 28' x 39'. The wrap-around porch forms an important element on its facade and contains about 300 square feet of area.

The interior of this house features original woodwork, including doors, door and window surrounds, and a staircase.

SITE

The Johnson House is situated on a portion of Lot 8 in Mendenhall's Addition to the City of Oskaloosa. This plat was laid out in only a few lots, each of which was subsequently subdivided. This parcel measures 60' x 164' (width by depth). The house stands on the north side of College Avenue and faces south.

A 1-story, detached frame garage is situated at the rear of the house. It was constructed circa 1940 and measures approximately 20' x 20'. This is considered a noncontributing resource.

This site is well landscaped with plantings. They include mature shade trees and shrubs and a well maintained lawn.

The site of this property is generally level in topography. The Iowa Yearly Meeting House-College Avenue Friends Church is located diagonally across College Avenue to the southwest from this house. North Market Street is situated approximately two blocks to the east, and Penn Boulevard, which is located one lot to the west, runs four blocks north to the new-site campus of William Penn College.





SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built circa 1910 as a single-family dwelling, the William A. and Ida C. Johnson House possesses historic significance, under National Register Criterion A, because it calls attention to the contributions of William to Penn College as a philanthropist and member of the Board of Trustees. The house also calls attention to the tendency of parents to move into Oskaloosa so that their children could attend Penn Academy and Penn College, as well as for families to offer room and board in their homes to children of other friends or relatives for the same reason.

The period of significance, under Criterion A, for the Johnson Family House is 1911-1923, the time the building served as residence for William A. Johnson's tenure as a college trustee.

The property contains one contributing resource for this nomination, the house, and one noncontributing resource, the garage.

EVENTS AND PATTERNS

The career of William A. Johnson and his contributions to Penn College illustrate how Quakers could and were involved in Friends' institutions in numerous ways. In 1916, immediately following the destruction of Main Building by fire, William contributed \$3,000 to Penn College for rebuilding. As president of the Board of Trustees at that time, Johnson pushed for the college to relocate its campus and build on what became the new-site campus.

About 1910, the William A. and Ida C. Johnson family moved into Oskaloosa so that their children could attend Friends' schools in Oskaloosa. Prior to this time, William had farmed. (He may have continued this or another occupation until about 1921, when the Oskaloosa City Directory lists him as retired.) This family provides a good example of the pattern mentioned above among Quakers in the vicinity of Oskaloosa.

From 1911 through 1923, William served as a member of the Board of Trustees of Penn College, and president of that board from 1915 through 1922. As "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa" shows, these years were critical for Penn College and witnessed the relocation of the school to its new-site campus.

Although significance, under National Register Criterion A, is not presently claimed for the associations of this building with student housing, further research might strengthen such claim. Penn College students, who lived in outlying areas, also attended to move into Oskaloosa and board in the homes of relatives or friends while they attended the college. Although the Women's Residence Building was built in 1917, no men's dormitory was available until 1962, when the west wing of Watson Hall opened. As a consequence, many students, but especially the males, were forced to live off-campus. The William A. and Ida C. Johnson House illustrates one choice open to students. They opened their home to their granddaughter, Thelma Johnson (now Mrs. Ben K. Shepherd), so that she could reside with them while attending Penn College. Thelma graduated with the class of 1940, thus

illustrating the prevalence of off-campus living even after the opening of the Women's Residence Building.

The examples of other Quaker families also illustrate the tendency of parents to move into Oskaloosa so their children could attend Friends' educational institutions. Howard Johnson, great-nephew of William A. and Ida C. Johnson, said in an oral informant interview, that his parents also moved into Oskaloosa in 1915 so that he and his brothers could attend Penn Academy and later Penn College (interview of February 7, 1992). This family provides another example of this tendency.

Howard Johnson comes from a long line of Quakers in Iowa. He was raised in Lynnville (Jasper County) prior to his family's relocation to Oskaloosa. Johnson's two great-uncles, Charles and Albert Johnson, contributed funds for Penn College to purchase the John White Farm, which later became the new-site campus for Penn College. Howard Johnson has served on the Board of Trustees of William Penn College, continuing the tradition of his family.

The siting of the Johnson House along College Avenue calls attention to this street as a corridor of residential preference among Quakers in Oskaloosa, particularly prior to the relocation of the Penn College campus to its new site.

The current resident is Martha Berry Johnson (widow of Elmer), a Penn graduate and the daughter of Dr. William E. Berry, an influential longtime Penn faculty member, and granddaughter of Penn President Absalom Rosenberger.

ARCHITECTURE

The attempt to convey a picturesque feeling--through a complex roof configuration, an irregular footprint, and wall surfaces broken by architectural details, such as the bay window on the east elevation--shows the influence of the Queen Anne taste. The columns and railings of this porch relate its design to the Free Classic architectural subtype within that style. Although these architectural elements and details elevate the house above many homes of similar vintage and architectural influence in Oskaloosa, the building lacks sufficient architectural significance in its own right for nomination to the National Register, under Criterion C.

REPRESENTATION IN OTHER CULTURAL RESOURCES SURVEYS

The Johnson House was surveyed in 1981 as part of the Area XV Regional Planning Commission's then comprehensive cultural resources surveys of Mahaska County. At that time, the Historical Survey did not identify or evaluate the building within the context of education in Oskaloosa. The Architectural Survey evaluated the building as not eligible for nomination, under National Register Criterion C. In the intervening years, more information has come to light regarding the Johnson House and its place within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa."

POTENTIAL FOR HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY
