DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rockaway Valley Methodist Church faces Valley Road. It is a small white one story clapboard building nestled amid maple trees and surrounded by the cemetery.

The original church was built without the front vestibule and cupola. A complete cellar was dug and rooms built in the basement in later years.

There are four stained glass windows on each side and two in the back and two in the front. These were donated by members of the church in honor of their ancestors in 1900.

The church is reputed to have been built on the site of an ancient Indian burial ground and the site of an old school house. The church was built in 1842. A slate roof was added in 1894. In 1912 the new hearing plant and banquet hall and social room were added in the basement. The cupola was added about 1895-1900.

The church proper is a rectangular 38 feet by 25 feet with an added front vestibule. The interior has two columns of seating with twenty pews divided by a center aisle. There are also narrow side aisles. While the pews occupy three-quarters of the floor space the last section is the chancel with a choir, alter, organ box, and pulpit.

Originally there was a gallery across the entrance for the use of a choir. This was removed as was the pulpit platform which was between the windows and raised so that three or four steps were needed to reach the pulpit. When the platform was changed four church seats, two on either side, in the cornors facing the pulpit were removed. These seats were called "Amen" seats. Later the seating was changed due to the generosity of the Morristown Church which was remodeling and the present seats were presented to the Rockaway Valley Methodist Church.

The Vestibule was added and took the place of an open porch about 1912.

In 1900 the twelve stained glass windows were donated by church members.

The cemetery dates to the building of the church (1841-42).

A carriage house once stood to the east of the church's front door but has long disappeared.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Rockaway Valley Methodist Church, built in 1842, is a plain rectangular frame and clapboard church building which is characteristic of the Protestant edifices erected throughout the nation in a agrarian or rural based environment. The needs of farmers were simple and the Rockaway Valley Methodist Church reflects their desires and lifestyles.

Within a mile of the Morris Canal the area shows little evidence of being effected by this major 19th century transportation route although materials for the church were apparently brought in from Newark via the canal to Powerville and then carted to Rockaway Valley by John Decker, who also housed the church carpenters.

Decker was among the first trustees for the church which also included Jacob Van Winkle, William M. Dixon, and Caleb W. Edwards - all prominent citizens in Rockaway Valley. The valley was the only portion of Boonton Township, formed in 1867 from Pequannock, which was arable.

The church has long been the center of community life in rural Boonton Township. The descendents of many of the earliest families are buried in the cemetery.

To this day people travel surprising distances to be married in this picturesque church.

The twelve stained glass windows of the chruch donated in 1900 represent the lives of the early residents of the area.

The Rockaway Valley Methodist Church was the center of community functions in this small village in the second half of the 19th century. The church continues as a focal point of the township to the present time.
