

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Ripton is a small mountain village located in the highlands of Addison County in west central Vermont. The village is oriented along a section of Route 125 which forms an arc .4 of a mile long between two bridges, each crossing the Middlebury River.

At the center of the arc, at the east side of the highway are a group of three structures; the Community House, Village School and the Methodist Church. The most prominent of these structures is the Community House, built in 1864 and executed in a variation of the Greek Revival style.

The Community House is a large one story structure, approximately 40 feet wide by 50 feet deep resting on a stone block foundation reinforced with poured concrete. The building is sheathed with narrow clapboards, and has a gable roof covered with asphalt shingles surmounted by a two tiered tower with louvered openings capped by a finial and weathervane.

The main (south) elevation is divided by four pilasters. The two center pilasters frame the recessed entrance portal. The portal ceiling is supported by two hollow wood fluted doric columns. One story rectangular entrances are located at each side of the portal. The elevation is surmounted by a massive moulded wood pediment conforming to the gable end.

Four large rectangular windows with 12 over 12 triple hung sash are set in each side of the structure.

The main meeting room was divided into two levels and adapted for community purposes in the late 1920's.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE


Brief History

That part of the land on the Chipman estate where the present Ripton Community House now stands was deeded by Sylvester Fisher in 1864 to the Congregational Society with the proviso that a house of worship costing not less than \$2000 must be erected within two years. The church was built and maintained by the Congregational Society until 1920 when it was deeded to the Troy Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to be used for 'religious, social and educational purposes.' This restriction was removed in 1928. About this time the land and building was deeded to the Ripton Community Club which made renovations and used the facilities for club meetings, social events, community dinners, square dancing for the young people, etc., until 1964 when the club was dissolved. At this time, the property was turned over to the town and has since been used for town meetings, community gatherings and suppers, Christmas entertainments for the school children, wedding receptions, etc., until condemned for such use in 1973.

It is hoped that through town funds matched with federal assistance, the exterior of the structure can be stabilized.

Significance

The Ripton Community House is the architectural nucleus of a typical Vermont mountain village. It is an excellent example of "Greek Revival Survival", and symbolizes the changes in the religious and social structure of the community over the period of a century. The building will soon be undergoing exterior stabilization and interior modernization in order to continue its service to the community.


