Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This three story brick building (1862), measuring approximately 19' x 65', is located on the north side of the Square, immediately west of the alley, at 115 W. Monroe. It is rectangular in shape, with the narrow end of the rectangle toward the street. The brick is the same rosy red brick used for the Brazelton House Hotel (1856, NRHP). It has been determined that this brick was of local manufacture. The roof is flat, sloping gently to the east. The facade features three round arched windows on the second and third floors, with brick patterned hoodmolds. The corbeling meets in such a manner as to create an arcade The secondary elevation on the alley side continues the use effect. of round arched windows on the second and third floors, but those on the first floor have stone lintels. An outside stairway leads to a second floor entry, not uncommon on many commercial buildings in the mid-west. The storefront has been altered at street level, but retains the original configuration of a central recessed entry flanked by display windows. The facade has been repointed. Originally this building had a heavy bracketed wooden cornice, similar to that seen on the Union Block next door east. Panels have been placed over the third floor windows (windows are intact on the inside), and the second floor windows have been partially blocked in and new (smaller) windows set in place. Despite these alterations, this building retains sufficient integrity to be immediately recognized as an early Italianate building from c.1860. It is one of four commercial buildings which visually represent this important period of construction in Mount Pleasant's history.

On the interior, the first floor is undivided open space, with dropped ceilings. On the second floor, an apartment occupies the front two-thirds. It has dropped ceilings and plaster board walls. The rear third, and the entire third floor are vacant, and appear to be in reasonably unaltered condition. An elevator shaft is located along the north wall. A third floor window in the north wall has been bricked-in.

This building is one of two in the community which have been documented as being constructed by William McCandless, although it is strongly believed that McCandless was probably responsible for many of the brick buildings around the Square from this period.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This building is significant under Criterion C as a good example of a Type II building, an early Italianate commercial design as seen in Mount Pleasant between 1855-c.1870, built by William McCandless.

This building is representative of the early Italianate style that appears to have gained popularity in Mount Pleasant with the construction of the Brazelton House Hotel (NRHP) in 1856. These buildings feature round arched windows with brick patterned hoodmolds, simple bracketed wooden cornices, and are constructed of locally manufactured rosy red brick. Historic photographs show that there were a number of buildings in the business district in this same design (perhaps as many as a dozen). Few of these retain sufficient integrity to be recognized as early Italianate buildings. William McCandless has been identified as the builder of this commercial building in 1862. He was also responsible for the Union Block directly across the alley to the east, and is said to have constructed a number of other buildings in town, including the Castor Building on the site of the present Masonic Temple Theater. The McCandless Building at 115 W. Monroe is a good example of this early type despite alterations. The location on the north side of the Square makes this a visually important building in the community.

With the arrival of the railroad in 1856, the town more than doubled in population in a three year period. New buildings were needed to house businesses and services, including hotels, restaurants, banks, drug stores, and jewelry stores. These new buildings were constructed along the north and east sides of the Square, and along the 100 block of N. Main. Brick was used as the primary building material for the most important of these buildings. The McCandless Building was originally leased to a Mr. Pennington for use as a dry goods store. By 1886 the Sanborn map shows it housing watches and jewelry. It continued as a jewelry store until c.1909 when it is shown as a candy shop, and later as a restaurant.



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
