Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Casa Peralta is a large residence located on a spacious lot of nearly one acre in the City of San Leandro, in the East Bay of Northern California's San Francisco Bay Area. The residence includes a large 2½ story main residence, a 4 story tower structure, a carriage house, storage area, as well as decorative fountains, a shrine, formal garden, and other landscape features. The residential compound is shelterd from the street by a seven foot cement wall.


Access to the compound is gained through two gates at the south peripheral wall. The easterly of these gates (photo # 13), the carriage gate, features two heavy wrought iron gates which allowed carriages to enter the tile and cement dirveway leading to the residence (photos 1 and 2). The westerly gate (photo 15) provided pedestrian access to the complex, opening to an eight foot wide tiled sidewalk, lined on either side by concrete benches. Along this sidewalk, one encounters the formal garden, built around a fountain, finished with hand-colored, glazed tiles and topped wit h a lamb figure. This sidewalk leads to the front porch entrance to the main residenze, which is decorated with hand-colored tiles illustrating Cervante's "Don Quixote," as well as adobe bricks salvaged from an 1830 residence once belonging to the Peralta family (Photo # 8).

The principal residence is a 2½ story Colonial Revival structure, altered in 1927 when the compound was remodeled to resemble a Spanish country estate. This hipped roof structure has porches with second story balconies at the front (south) and rear (north). This structure retains is essential Colonial Revival chracter in its fenesyration (including a Palladian motif at the west elevation, Photo # 9), its roofline, and its decorative detail, such as the modillions, Tuscan columns, and dentillated cornice.

The Colonial Revival structure, however, is skillfully integrated into the dominant Spanish estate theme of t e compound. The four story towner is joined to the principal residence by a one story passageway topped by a balustrade, punctuated by the large arched carriage entrance. The tower is marked by four hipped roof lines, diminishing in scale as they approach the pyramidal hipped roof of the belvedere. The lower segment, serving as a guest house at one time, can be entered through arched entrances at the south, west, and east. The second segment of the tower resembles a "lookout (mirador)", with three round-headed arched openings at each elevation. The third and fourth segments of the tower represent a cupola, topped by a small belvedere.

flso located on this property is a gable roofed storage area, north of the tower; a hipped roof carriage house; and a fountain at the rear (north) of the large courtyard located between the primary residence and the tower. The lot is well-landscaped, retaining the basic landscape plan of John McLaren.

8. Significance

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Casa Peralta is significant for its association with the important Peralta family and as an unusually detailed and historically accurate example of Hispanic-influenced architecture in California in the early decades of the twentieth century. This structure represents an attempt by Merminia Peralta Dargie to express her Spanish heritage by recreating, or approximating, the ancestral Peralta estate in Spain. While related to Mission Revival and Spanish Colonial architecture in its romanticizing of the California Hispanic tradition, this structure personalizes this tradition for one of the great Hispanic California pioneer families.

The founder of the Peralta family in California was Luis Maria Peralta who arrive in California in 1775 and served 44 years in the army, including duty as comisionado of the Pueblo of San Jose. In 1842, Luis divided his large landholdings in the East Bay among his five sons. One son, Ygnacio, built an adobe in what is now San Leandro, which remains and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Ygnacio's daughter, Ludovino, bought the property on which the Casa Peralta is located in 1874 and in 1901 built the Colonial Revival residence that is the core of the Casa Peralta. Upon Ludovino's death, the house was occupied by her sister, Maria and upon Maria's death, the property passed to her niece; Hermania Peralta Dargie. The property, then, was long and closely associated with the Peralta family even before the Casa Peralta was constructed.

Hermania Peralta Dargie was married to William E. Dargie, who founded the Oakland <u>Tribune</u>, the most influential newspaper in the East Bay, in 1874. Dargie continued to publish the <u>Tribune</u> until his death in 1914. Upon Dargie's death, Herminia travelled widely in Europe, particularly in her ancestral homeland of Spain. In the mid-1920s, she commissioned Captain Antonio Martin, a Spanish architect, to remodel her home in the manner of a home of the Spanish titled class, particularly that of the Peralta family. The grounds of the compound were planned by John McLaren, superintendent of San Francisco's Golden Gate Park between 1887 and 1943 and known as "The Father of Golden Gate Park."

Martin succeeded in adapting this Colonial Revival residence into a complex of a far different character. His design provided for the retention of Georgian and Federal style design features of the original strucutre, even repeating some of those features in the additions, while creating a distinctively Spanish Renaissance feeling throughout though the lawish use of imported colored tiles, fountains, tile roofs, and so forth.

After the death of Herminia Peralta Dargie, the Casa Peralta was occupied by a series of rest homes. This use required some functional changes to the building, most ... notably the inclusion of institutional bathrooms and kitchen. In general, however, the complex is remarkably unchanged from its 1927 appearance. Upon the closure of the last rest home in 1971, the Casa Peralta was scheduled for demolition to make

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

Real property in the City of San Leandro, County of Alameda, State of California, described as follows:


