DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ferguson House was designed by architect William L. Stoddart and built by the owner's construction company around 1906-7. It is a 2 1/2 story house in the English Tudor or Elizabethan Revival Style and is basically rectangular in plan, with several projecting gabled wings. It is located on a slightly elevated stepped or terraced lot with mature trees, shrubs and landscaping.

The house is of fire-resistant construction with thick masonry interior bearing walls. The exterior is of Flemish-bond brickwork on the first floor, and with a stucco half-timber second floor and gable facades. The roof is a medium slope gable with slate shingles and wrought-iron snowstops.

The house features three arched porches, three chimneys (Flemishbond) and six fireplaces. The roof gables have slightly-flared edges with decorative moldings and verge boards. The roof has deep overhangs at the cornice and gables and heavy decorative supporting brackets at the corners. The front windows on the first floor (top panels) are stained glass with work done by the Menik Company of Hamburg, Germany and New York City. The house contains 18 rooms, seven bathrooms and has imported woods - quartered oak, mahogany, and maple - for paneling, window and door surrounds, and the large central staircase.

Purchased in 1943 by Mr. Charles Scanlon, the building has since functioned as both a private residence and a funeral home. Interior alterations were kept to a minimum to accommodate its expanded function as a funeral home. As a result, the home has retained much of its original integrity.

The immediate neighborhood consists of 2 1/2 and 3 story private residences; some can be described as mansions, others as general middle-class dwellings. The neighborhood is well-kept. There is a twelve-story senior citizen high-rise apartment located two blocks away. A modern, single-story private school (Yavneh Academy) is located on the block immediately adjacent to the Ferguson House.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ferguson House is architecturally significant as an example of an English Tudor-Revival style half-timber dwelling. It is well sited on a corner location. Additionally, it was constructed by its original owner, John W. Ferguson, a builder and construction contractor in Paterson in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Its major significance stems from its association with Mr. Ferguson. Mr. Ferguson's company was active in reconstructing downtown Paterson after its disastrous fire of 1902. Many of Paterson's public and commercial structures of the period were built by his company. Included were the Hamilton Trust Company, United Bank Building, the Hamilton Club Building, Meyer Brothers Department Store, and the Edison Illuminating Lights Company (now a Salvation Army building).

His ability as a builder was widely known, and some of his works in other states are listed in the <u>History of Paterson and Its Environs</u> by William Nelson (1920). He was also very active in numerous civic endeavors and World War I bond drives. He served on two New Jersey State commissions; one the Rahway Reformatory Commission, and the other, the Commission on Industrial Education. The significance of the property lies in its direct association with one of the City of Paterson's "turn of the century" businessmen.
