45. Description and House Plan:

This $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story brick house faces south. The architectural character of the building is revealed more in the broad gable-ends than in the facade, a shallow-pitched gabled projection obscured by metal awnings installed in the mid-20th century. Besides the front porch, variations from the square mass of the building include two, shallow, shed-roofed projections on the west (left) and one on the east (right). The walls are of buff pressed brick, and the masonry detail is of smooth-dressed stone, including flush stone ornament at the cap location of the porch piers. Additional ornament includes the fascial boards and the gable peaks. All guttering is of copper, and the eaves are tongue-and-groove. All the windows, except the metal casement windows in the basement and the pair of windows in the front gable, are recent anodized aluminum sash; because these windows are of the same type as the originals and because of their dark brown color, they do not stand out obstrusively.

The brick, gabled single-bay garage on the east (right) of the house matches the house in materials and was constructed at the same time. A 2-car garage in the east of the basement wall, as well as flanking retaining walls, are a recent remodelling. A concrete sidewalk extends back from the rear kitchen door to a chicken house and a round, concrete well-head.

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
