### Summary Description

The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches, among the six resources associated with the Logan/Esterly placer mine operations that are contained in this nomination, comprise two channels, one-quarter mile long and forty feet wide each, constructed about1910 in conjunction with hydraulic placer mining in the Llano de Oro mines. The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches served the mining operations between 1907 and 1917 under ownership of James T. Logan and subsequently those of George Esterly and lessees between 1917 and 1942. The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches enable us to clearly understand the technology employed in varying periods to extract gold from soils in the Waldo vicinity. It retains integrity of location, design, setting, workmanship and feeling, and accurately conveys the historic associations for which they are significant.

#### Location and Setting

The two Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches, of which twelve-hundred feet are preserved on Bureau of Land Management property, are located along the base of a serpentine knoll on the north edge of French Flat. in the northeast quarter of Section 22, Township 40 South, Range 8 West, W.M. (Josephine County Assessors Plat 40-8-22, Tax Lot 200), about six miles south of Cave Junction, Oregon. Situated in a valley at an elevation of 1,540 feet above sea level, these drain ditches are accessible from Bureau of Land Management Road 40-8-28 approximately two mile from that road's intersection with the Waldo Road. Soils in the vicinity of the ditches are coarse sand and sandy loam. The onsite plant community consists of Douglas fir, ponderosa pine, cedar, manzanita, buckbrush, and poison oak. Water to operate the mines in French Flat was from the Logan/Esterly Middle Ditch, among others, diverted from the East Fork Illinois. Runoff from the mines was channeled through the drain ditches (Budy 1999 35HS11-494).

The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches are part of the vast system used to channel runoff from the hydraulic mines in French Flat through the Logan Cut to the West Fork Illinois River. The Logan Cut, a large, deep tailrace constructed in the 1880s

> and expanded after 1900, initially served to drain off waste water and tailings from the mines. Just below the drain ditches, a dam (extant today on private lands) controlled flow through the drains. Runoff from the Esterly pits was stored in the reservoir and drained through the two channels to Logan Cut and then to the West Fork Illinois River. After the drain ditches leave Bureau of Land Management property, they course through private lands and connect via a tunnel and a deep cut feature to the south edge of Logan Cut in Carroll Slough (Shenon 1933:Plat 11). Although once considerably deeper, the drain ditches have a flattened central profile and the present functional channel is about six feet wide and two feet deep (Budy 1999: 35HS11-494).

### Integrity

The segments of the Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches on Bureau of Land Management lands are well preserved, although the depth of the drainage ditches has eroded today and some vegetation has been re-established. Clearly visible in length and width, the Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches retain integrity of location, setting, design, and feeling and convey the associations with placer mining activities throughout the Waldo vicinity. The ditches, together with the Logan Cut and other features associated with the Logan/Esterly operations in the Waldo vicinity, enable the observer's to understand the mining technology that significantly affected development in the Upper Illinois Valley.

#### Significance

The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches, constructed after 1900 and in use until about 1940, are locally significant for their association with mining technology and water manipulation in the Upper Illinois Valley, Waldo vicinity. Submitted as part of a multiple property submission, "Mining Resources of the Upper Illinois Valley, Oregon," the Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches represent their associated historic context, "Gold Placer Mining and Development of the Waldo Vicinity, 1851-1942." The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches meet the registration requirements outlined in the registration document. They were developed in the historic period and retain of integrity of location, setting, design and feeling to evoke direct historic associations with mining in the Upper Illinois Valley. The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches are eligible to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A as important, tangible representatives of historic mining activities in the Upper Illinois Valley.

#### **History**

In 1883 George Simmons acquired extensive mining property formerly the Samuel Scott Donation Land Claim. He also acquired ownership of an intermittent waterway known as Carroll (Carron) Gulch from the Carron estate. Simmons soon sold a half-interest in the property to Frank Ennis and Theodoric Cameron and mining records show that Frank Ennis et. al. established the placer location on February 26, 1883 (Josephine County Mining Records 4:368). In 1887 Theodoric Cameron located additional mining ground (Josephine County Mining Records 5:135). Holding 900 acres, the firm was known as Ennis, Simmons and Co. (Josephine County Deeds 3:300; *Rogue River Courier* July 30, 1886; Chapman Publishing Company 1904:229).

James T. Logan, mine superintendent for the Simmons-Cameron operations, developed the Logan Wash Ditch shortly after 1900 and initiated the use of hydraulic elevators to lift gravels from pits that were more than fifteen below the ground surface in French Flat. Logan, who in 1900 married Ella Simmons, daughter of George and Jane Simmons, assumed management of operations following his father-in-law's death on October 6, 1901. Gradually the mines and

> ditches Logan acquired took his name (Josephine County Marriage Records; Chapman Publishing Company 1904: 986; *Grants Pass Daily Courier* December 31, 1927, 1:6; Grants Pass *Bulletin* January 29, 1937,1:6; Josephine County Mining Records, 4:457).

In March 1902, James Logan acquired the Cameron share of the mining property known as the 'Simmons and Cameron claims.' The transfer included improvements described as the Upper Ditch, the Upper race, the Lower Main Pipe Ditch and the main sluice ditch (Josephine County Mining Records 4:476). Beginning about 1907, Logan focused much of his mining efforts on four pits in the French Flat area. While ample water was available during the mining season, Logan operated hydraulic giants in the pits, as well as two hydraulic elevators and one giant for stacking tailings (Shenon 1933:187). The Logan/Esterly Upper and Middle Upper Ditches provided water for these operations. At this time, Logan constructed the Logan Wash Ditch, expanded the large cut that had been developed by Simmons and Cameron, and initiated construction of the Logan Drain Ditches.

In 1916 geologists noted that the Logan Simmons and Cameron mine, "commonly known as the Logan Placer," was under option to George Esterly of Seattle, Washington. Engineer L.A. Levensaler of Tacoma had taken charge of investigating the mining prospects of the property (Parks and Swartley 1916:143). On June 26, 1917 George and Marilla Esterly, Louis Levensaler, along with James Logan located a placer claim, and on August 16, 1917 James Logan sold his mining operation to the Waldo Corporation. This newly-formed organization had \$100,000 in capital stock and an office in Seattle. George M. Esterly was the company's general manager (Josephine County Deed Records 28:276; Josephine County Mining Records 23:233-234).

George Esterly was born June 15, 1868 in Wisconsin. Described in the Portland Oregonian as "one of the best-known mining men in the west," Esterly was a mechanical and mining engineer who had developed extensive Alaskan mining interests. He and his wife, Marilla Esterly invested personal funds in a sizeable tract, constructed a large dwelling on the property and, gave the name Llano de Oro or Plain of Gold to their extensive mine. With their purchase the mines and

associated ditches increasingly became known by the Esterly name. The Esterlys replaced or extensively modified the Logan home near the Waldo road and installed a significant amount of up-to-date mining equipment on the property. Esterly would live out his life at Waldo where he died on December 2, 1931 (*Portland Oregonian* December 4, 1931, 19:5-6).

In December 1920, the Waldo Corporation sold mining property, buildings, barns and equipment, not owned personally by the Esterly family, to Victor H. Elfsendahl and Thad Sweek of Seattle (Josephine County Deeds 52:360). In June 1923, these buyers sold the property to G.W. Hales of Cook County Illinois (Josephine County Deed Records 62:512). In the 1930s, G.W. Hales leased out the mining property to others who worked the property until July 1942 (Hill 1979: 78). The Logan Drain Ditches remained in use by these lessees and other until 1942.

### **Verbal Boundary Description**

The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches are located in the northeast quarter of Section 22, Township 40 South, Range 8 West, W.M., (Josephine County Assessor's Plats 40-8-22, Tax Lot 200). The property is identified on USGS map O'Brien quadrangle (7.5 minute series).

This linear site contains two parallel ditches 0.25 miles long, that drained water from the Llano de Oro Mine settling pond into the Logan Cut. The ditches begin on the property boundary line of Tax Lot 200 (where it meets the northern border of Tax Lot 300 near this tax lot's northeastern corner) in the SW ¼ of the NE ¼ of Section 22, T.40 S. R. 8 W., (W.M.) The ditches continue north to the Section 22/15 section line, T. 40 S., R. 8 W., (W.M.).

The portions of the Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches thus described constitute the center line of a linear site. The side boundaries of this linear site are lines of convenience parallel to the ditches extending 50 feet on each side of each ditch, overlapping in places. The resulting site is 100 feet wide, following the contours of the ditch. The Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches contain a total acreage of 6.449 acres.

#### **Verbal Boundary Justification**

The nominated area includes the Logan/Esterly Drain Ditches and their immediate setting contained on land administered by the Bureau of Land Management and associated with historic placer mining activities in the Waldo vicinity.


