	DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE									

The McClure-Barbee House, 304 South Fourth Street, Danville, Kentucky, remains largely the same as it was when it was built a century and a half ago. Containing two stories with nine rooms, the house is constructed of bricks fired from yellow clay - an attribute that is rare in southern Greek Revival architecture. The recessed front porch renders the house significant. Typically Kentuckian in its layout, the house is L-shaped and has a porch along the southwestern side of its rear extremity. Interior mantels and woodworks are original. Shutters are a dark green; the columns and exterior trim is a brilliant white. A sunken garden constitutes the backyard.

Dr. George McClure, who has lived in the house since 1980 reports that no one in his family has ever made any structural modifications to the house. Inspection reveals however, three changes that were made sometime in the half century prior to the McClure's ownership. These changes are threefold: (A) The ell on the south side of the house had been added; today it is used as a bathroom and is obscured from exterior view by foliage. (B) At one time, there were doors at either emdeof the portico that led into the bedroom and parlor; these entrances have been bricked over. (C) The present kitchen area has also been added to the house, and the old kitchen became the present dining room.

Again, these changes were made sometime before the turn of the century; the external appearance of the house remains, for all practical purposes, unaltered.

The McClure-Barbee House, 304 South Fourth Street, Danville, must surely rank as one of Kentucky's, fif not one of the nation's, finest examples of Greek Revivalism in America's architectural history.

Designed by one of central Kentucky's mostipeominent architects, Robert Russel (1792-1873), and built perhaps as late as 1852, the house is a marked departure from Russellssother works in that the portico is inset between the end rooms and is supported by two very simple Doric dolumns. In none of his other structures does Russel exhibit such symetrical and simple taste Tts uniqueness and beauty has led Rexford Newcomb to include the house in his Old Kentucky Architecture as one of the state's brightest architectural gems. And Talbot Hamlin has said of the McClure-Barbee House that ...!! the essential beauty of the (American Greek Revival) style is beautifully shown in the simple, dignified, and beautifully proportioned recessed porch.

The house is of outstanding significance as a beautiful example of Southern ante-bellum architecture. Certainly, Russel, who also designed "Olde Centre" and Danville's First Presbyterian Church Building, and Samuel Porter Barbee, its first occupant, and commissioner of Russel, deserve much credit for leaving such a fine legacy.

Barbee did not actually stay in the house for too long a period and ownership has changed many times over the years. the house's most prominent occupant was Dr. Stephen L. Yerkes, tong time President of the now defunt Danville Theological During the Civil War the school remained strongly pro-Union in an otherwise Southern-sympathizing section of the State.

In 1908, Professor George McClure of the Kentucky School for the Deaf, purchased the house; upon his death, it passed to his son, Dr. George M. McClure.
