Narrative Description

The Shawano Post Office is a one-story, red brick building with sandstone trim. It is located in the central business district of the seat of Shawano County, Wisconsin.

This building is an example of the modern abstraction of the classical styles. The plan is rectangular, with the public entrance and lobby on the Main Street façade. The elevation is organized symmetrically about the entry doors. The windows of the front elevation are set in recessed panels with sandstone trim. Sandstone relief panels over the front doors and two central windows show a train, a boat and a plane. The two corner windows are narrower and only have sandstone lintels, rather than decorative panels. All of the windows have a sandstone panel below. A sandstone watertable is located below the window panels. A sandstone beltcourse and cornice demarcate the brick frieze, which wraps around the building. The entry stairs are granite with sandstone sidewalls.

The cornerstone reads: "Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, James A. Farley, Postmaster General, Louis A. Simon, Supervising Architect, Neal A. Melick, Supervising Engineer, 1937."

The side elevations carry on the theme of the front elevation. The windows at each corner have sandstone panels extending to the watertable. The four windows of the central portion of each side elevation do not have these panels. All six windows have sandstone lintels. All of the windows of the building are aluminum replacements. The rear of the building features an original one-story loading dock.

The interior has the original tile floor and wainscot. The walls and ceiling are of plaster. The original wood trim and vestibule remain. Modern lighting has been added, as well as a glass panel with a door to separate parts of the lobby.

Above the door to the postmaster's office is a mural titled "The First Settlers." It is signed and dated "Eugene Higgins, 1939." The painting depicts a pioneer setting. In the left foreground, a man is felling a large tree. To the right, a second man is preparing the felled trees for transport. Also in the foreground is a mother with two small children. They sit with their backs to the viewer and are observing a passing wagon train in the background. In the far distance, partially obscure by a hill, is a complex of large farm buildings.

The building at Shawano is of similar design to the post offices in Kewaune and Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, which date from the same period. While the interior of the Shawano Post Office has remained largely intact, the exterior retains less integrity than the two similar examples.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Shawano Post Office is an example of a small, Federal post office with an intact, Depression-era mural. It is nominated in the context of the "United States Post Office Construction from 1913-1940, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District" Multiple Property Nomination. The Shawano Post Office is eligible for listing under Criterion C for Art.

Historic Context

This building is the first federally owned post office in Shawano. Prior to its construction in 1937, postal services were conducted in various locations selected by a series of local postmasters. This post office is one of several constructed in Wisconsin by the Public Works Administration in the 1930s. The history of post office construction in Wisconsin in this period and under this program is explained in the multiple property nomination.

The design of the Shawano Post Office is similar to those in Kewaunee and Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin. In Shawano the original windows have been replaced, affecting its architectural integrity. The lobby area has been somewhat altered, although many original features remain, preserving much of the context for the mural.

Significance

The Shawano Post Office is significant for the public works program mural in its lobby. The history and context of the federal arts program is discussed in the multiple property nomination. In 1939 artist Eugene Higgins completed the mural titled "Early Settlers." Higgins also painted murals in post offices in Beaver Creek, Pennsylvania, and Mount Pleasant, Tennessee.

Eugene Higgins was one of the older painters working for the federal arts program and did not attempt mural painting until the competitions sponsored by the Section of Fine Arts. Higgins was born in Kansas City, Missouri. His artistic training was at the School of Fine Arts in St. Louis and then in Paris at the Julian Academy and the Ecole des Beaux-Arts from 1897 to 1904. Higgins was an exhibitor at the 1917 Independents show in New York and was later elected to the National Academy of Design.

Eugene Higgins obtained the Shawano commission as a result of the high quality of his submission to the national mural competition for the Post Office and Justice Department buildings. The mural in Shawano is

the result of correspondence with the local postmaster and the Section of Fine Arts in the Treasury Department. The executed mural was one of two studies presented by Higgins for the work. In April 1939 the mural went on display at Grand Central Galleries. After its installation in May 1939, Higgins changed the name of the work from "First Settlers" to "Early Settlers" after a logger pointed out that the first settlers had arrived by boat rather than by covered wagon.⁵

Although it has had some modern alterations, the Shawano Post Office retains a largely historic setting for its Works Progress Administration mural. The work is representative of government sponsored art during the Depression, as a way to employ America's artists and as a means to bring art to the general population via commissioned works in public buildings. The building meets the registration criteria for a post office with an intact public works program mural.
