DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Mary's College is located in the center of Marion County, in southcentral Kentucky, near the small community of St. Mary. This complex of buildings is situated away from the main road in a verdant area of the county. Nine buildings comprise the St. Mary campus.

At the northwest end of the complex sits the one-story, 1904 <u>Gymnasium Building</u>. A high, cut-stone foundation supports the brick structure and hipped, standing seam roof shelters it. Hipped roof dormers project from each end of the building. The gym is seven bays deep and four bays wide, with each bay recessed and topped by a segmental arch. All window openings are segmentally arched also (See photo 1).

Just to the south of the gym is an L-shaped 1830s classroom building, <u>Columbia</u>. It is a three-story, Flemish bond brick structure with jack arches and a dormered, mansard roof. The main entrance is located in the angle of the ell. The interior was remodelled in the 1930s for use as modern classrooms (See photo 2).

The east side of the campus is made up of a three-building complex. The southernmost structure is a classroom building built in the 1830s, <u>Refectory</u>. Three stories in height, it has Flemish bond brickwork and jack arches. The main south facade has a fanlight, columned entrance with sidelights. As with the other two main building, a mansard roof with dormers and fish-scale shingling tops the structure. A two-story, brick maintenance structure extends from the east side of this building (See photos 3-5).

The <u>Chapel</u> is connected, in an ell formation, to the north side of the previously mentioned structure. It is a one-story, Flemish bond brick structure. Gothic windows with leaded glass motifs grace each side. A standing seam roof covers this apse-form building (See photos 6-8).

A third structure in this three-building complex is an 1830s dormitory, <u>Shamrock</u>. Similar in scale and design to the others, it is a three-story, Flemish bond brick structure, with jack arches. A mansard roof with dormers tops this building also (See photo 9-10).

Northeast of Shamrock is a <u>brothers residence</u> that was constructed in 1916. It is a two-story, pyramidal roofed frame structure. A one-story Victorian style porch graces the front of the building (See photo 11).

Southeast of the main complex is a small, one-story photo laboratory. Constructed of brick, it has segmental arches, and a pyramidal standing seam roof. A pyramidal roofed monitor tops the structure (See photo 12).

Directly south of the photo lab is a two-sectioned, one-story utility building. The structure has common bond brick pattern, segmental arched openings and a standing seam roof. A small, brick pyramidal roofed building, sitting at the southeast corner of the complex, is also included in the historic campus. Two other 20th century buildings were constructed for use by the college (See photo 13).

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Before it closed in 1976, St. Mary's College was the third oldest operating Catholic college for boys in the nation and was a leader in Catholic education in the state. Established in 1821, St. Mary's was in operation thirteen years before Marion County was formed. The extant main college buildings on St. Mary's campus are of a style and composition that reflect the early character of the complex.

Present-day Marion and Nelson counties have one of the oldest and largest Catholic populations in the state of Kentucky. There were many Catholic families <sup>in</sup> this area as early as 1787. At that time, four American Sees were created: Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Bardstown, Kentucky. Father Benedict Joseph Flaget was appointed bishop of the Bardstown See.

Reverend Charles Nerinckx, a native of Belgium, came to Kentucky in 1805 as Flaget's assistant and remained in the state for 19 years. After he established a sisterhood to educate the girls in the area in 1812, Reverend Nerinckx had plans to begin a school for boys. He purchased a farm of 311 acres, naming the area Mount Mary. His plan was based on the school at Loretto which he helped start in 1812 (see National Register form for Loretto Motherhouse.) In 1819 Father Nerinckx traveled to Europe and in his absence the land was purchased by Reverend William Byrne. He opened St. Mary's College in 1821 using an abandoned distillery on the farm as a classroom building. Two previously established Catholic colleges included: Georgetown College in Washington, D.C., established in 1789 and Mount St. Mary's College in Maryland, established in 1808. Although funds were scarce, and the school experienced several fires, Father Byrne managed to keep St. Mary's running for over 12 years. During that time over 1,000 students received degrees.<sup>1</sup> In 1833, the school was turned over to the Society of Jesuits and Father Byrne passed away the same year.

St. Mary's continued under the administration of the Jesuits from 1833 to 1846. This period was marked by prosperity and the school earned a reputation for its scholarly and wholesome atmosphere. By 1837, the school had grown considerably and was chartered by the state legislature.

Most of the older structures on St. Mary's campus date to the Jesuit period. The Columbia, Shamrock, Old Chapel, and Refectory buildings were all constructed in the 1830s at a cost of \$50,000.

Some of the well-known alumni of St. Mary's include: The Honorable J. Proctor Knott (1830-1911, later Governor of Kentucky), Theodore O'Hara (1820-1851, journalist and author) and The Honorable Elisha Standiford (President of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad from 1875 to 1880).

In 1906 Eden Villa, a two-story, three-bay brick administration building was erected. It has a pyramidal roof, denticulated cornice, and keystones over the window openings. A two-bay dormer with pyramidal roof graces the roof. A brick garage with a standing seam roof sits to the east of Eden Villa. Eden Villa is situated north of the main campus. It is separated from the older structures by a 1960s brick administration building (See photos 14- 15).

#### Non-Contributing Structures

The three-story brick administration building, constructed in the 1960s and located between Eden Villa (L) and the rest of the campus, is not a contributing element (See photo 16).

The nominated area includes all historic buildings which comprise the campus, and which contribute to the visual integrity of the site.

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#### ADDENDUM

Boundary Justification

The boundary of the St. Mary's College Historic District nomination was drawn so as to encompass all historic structures which comprise the campus area. The campus buildings include the following: classroom buildings, dormatories, chapel, utility buildings, and faculty residences.

The farm buildings shown on the 1953 USGS map outside the boundary are no longer extant.

Located within the district is a 1960s college administration building which, because of its association with the college and its unobtrusive architecture, is not considered an intrusion, but a contributing element to the district.

After 1846, the Jesuits relinquished control of St. Mary's to take over Fordham University in New York and the Diocesans assumed authority over the school. This period at St. Mary's proved uneventful until the outbreak of the Civil War. Many students left to enlist, and their departure financially drained the institution. St. Mary's was forced to close her doors from 1869 to 1871.

The Resurrectionist fathers took over St. Mary's in 1870 and spent \$7,000 and one year repairing the structures. In 1884 a new administration building was erected at a cost of \$20,000.<sup>2</sup> Ten years later all of the buildings were renovated, a water and steam heating system installed, and some additional farmland was purchased.<sup>3</sup> Another building period occurred in 1904 when the new brick gymnasium was constructed at a cost of \$15,000. "Eden Villa," a brick house built in 1906, and a brothers residence, built in 1916, were the last two historic buildings constructed at St. Mary's. The last improvements were made in 1938 on the Columbia building when it was renovated inside and out for use as modern classrooms.

St. Mary's reached its peak enrollment with 339 students in 1965-66 but the school experienced a decline shortly after. Student enrollment was down to 37 by 1976, when St. Mary's closed.

Most of St. Mary's building were constructed in the 1830s in the Federal style. Although they were Victorianized in 1894 the alterations were tasteful and well executed. The fine brickwork and the Federal scale and massing remain. Of particular note is the finely proportioned fanned entrance on the Refectory building. The remaining structures can be said to reflect the good basic design and construction evident in the original 19th century buildings.

<sup>1</sup>They were from all parts of the state and many of them returned to their respective communities and established private schools where they endeavored to emulate their alma mater. Thus, the benefits of education were not confined to those who had been students at St. Mary's, but were wide-ranging in their effect.

<sup>2</sup> This structure was known as Byrne Hall and was destroyed by fire in the mid-1970s.

<sup>3</sup>Originally the main buildings on campus faced south. Both Columbia and the Refectory were three stories in height, with gabled roofs, and fan lit entrances.
