Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Charles W. Van De Mark House is a two-story wood frame house built in 1884. It stands on the northeast corner of its block, facing north toward Washington Street, which is the main street of Clyde.

As originally built, the house was essentially rectangular with a rear service wing to the south. Its design is a relatively restrained, rectilinear expression of the American Queen Anne Style of the 1880s. The lines of the steep hipped roof are broken by a gabled projecting bay in the center of the second story of the front facade. The walls are clad in horizontal boards on the first story and patterned wood shingles on the second. The projecting bay has a shingled gable with decorative vergeboards. The whouse originally had a shed-roofed, center-gabled full-length porch with chisel-worked rectangular posts. In the 1930s this porch was replaced with a bungalow-style porch and porte-cochere.

The interior plan of the house consists of four rooms on each floor separated by a central stair hall, with service rooms in the rear wing. The most ornate interior space is the dining room, which features a walnut wainscot and a parquet floor made up of alternating narrow strips of oak and walnut. The dining room is separated from the northwest parlor by double sliding doors of walnut. The central staircase is walnut, as is much of the trim around the walls.

In the late 1960s a flat-roofed, one-story wing was added to the east side of the house. An addition was made to the rear in 1980 to accommodate the enlarged kitchen and restrooms necessitated by the conversion of the house for use as a restaurant.

Despite the loss of integrity brought about by the replacement of the porch in the 1930s and the recent additions, the house has retained its architectural character, especially on the interior, and stands as one of the most prominent of the remaining early homes of Clyde.

The Charles W. Van De Mark house has local architectural significance as one of the most elaborate and best preserved of the late nineteenth-century houses of Clyde.

Although it lost some integrity of design with the additions and the replacement of the porch, the house still retains much of its architectural character as one of the major local examples of the American Queen Anne style.

The house was built in 1884 for Charles W. Van De Mark, a native of Junius, New York, who moved to Clyde in 1879. In 1880 he and his brother Martin founded the bank of Clyde. He rose to prominence in the community as a businessman and attorney, and was actively involved in agriculture as well, owning over 1350 acres of farmland by 1902.

After Charles W. Van De Mark died in 1917, his family sold the house, which changed ownership many times before it was purchased by the present owners. At various times in its history it was used as a hospital, an apartment house, and a funeral home. Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd E. Erickson purchased the house in 1979 and have converted it for use as a restaurant.
