### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Dr. John W. Todd House consists of two portions--a two story frame Greek Revival main block dating from c.1872 and a one story frame wing dating from c.1867. The house is located on a large well-treed lot on the outskirts of the town of Homer. Despite numerous alterations, the property retains its National Register eligibility.

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The Todd House was originally two free-standing structures, located on the same lot, which were later put together to form the present rambling residence. The earlier structure (c.1867) is a plain single story two room house under a gable roof. The later (c.1872) structure is a two story, five bay, Greek Revival house with a pedimented portico and a rear gallery.

As originally built, the c.1872 house was one room deep and consisted of a central hall and two large rooms on each floor. It had two unusual Greek Revival characteristics: (1) The colossal front portico had only two columns. (2) The second story rear gallery platform and front portico balcony were cantilevered out from the structure of the house. (They did not touch the columns.) Other features included aedicule style mantels, four panel doors, 9 over 9 windows downstairs and 9 over 6 windows upstairs, and modified ogee moldings. When it was built, the c.1872 house had something of a retardataire character. For example, the moldings were typical of the 1850's, and the windows were typical of the 1830's or even earlier.

Major changes occurred in 1939. At that time the c.1872 house was rotated 90 degrees (from facing north to west) and the smaller c.1867 house was moved closer and connected to the c.1872 house via a hyphen wing. About two-thirds of the old rear gallery was enclosed (which meant the removal of the second story cantilevered platform). The downstairs hall was divided and one of the downstairs walls was moved to create a rear kitchen. Other changes made in 1939 include the replacement of many of the downstairs moldings and the newel post. In addition, the present chimney is a replacement. Finally, only one of the original four aedicule style mantels survives. (Apparently the other three were already gone by 1939.)

### Assessment of Integrity:

The principal elevation with its colossal pedimented portico establishes the Todd House's importance as a domestic example of the Greek Revival. This, of course, remains intact. Hence, in our opinion, the house retains its Register eligibility despite the admittedly numerous alterations. For the record, the 1939 reorientation has not affected the house's eligibility either. It is, of course, still on the same piece of property in its original setting.

To the south of the house is a modern frame garage which, of course, is listed as a non-contributing element.

# 8. Significance

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criterion C

The Todd House is locally significant in the area of architecture as perhaps the finest of a limited number of surviving Greek Revival residences in Claiborne Parish.

The Todd House was brought to our attention through the recently completed Claiborne Parish comprehensive historic structures survey. The survey identified some 545 50+ year old buildings, most of which are cabins, cottages, bungalows, or "vernacular" commercial buildings. Although Claiborne Parish was settled in the 1820's, the vast majority of its patrimony dates from the early twentieth century. In terms of residences, the earliest stylistic period one sees a good deal of is Queen Anne Revival. Not much remains from the earlier Greek Revival period. The survey has identified thirteen examples, of which the Todd House is perhaps the finest. It is one of only three two story examples, and, most importantly, it is the only example to feature a pedimented portico. (All of the other examples have columnar galleries without pediments or porticos.)
