7 Description

The Samuel Weston Homestead of Skowhegan, Maine is without doubt one of the finest examples of post-colonial architecture in the Upper Kennebec River valley.

The structure is of a two-story wood frame "L-plan" with the main clapboarded facade facing east and a secondary facade of the same nature facing south. The main facade is six bays wide and fenestration is 12/12 with a first floor main portico supported by Doric coloumns. There is an asymetrical arrangement of the main facade with an original element to the right that housed Samuel Weston's office. This has a simple doorway with a four-light transom. The building has a metal-sheathed hipped roof and two internal brick chimneys. The rear of the structure is shingled and has a first floor porch running the length of the structure. The interior of the building is largely intact and is a lovely example of transitional Georgian to Federal decoration.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Samuel Weston Homestead on the Kennebec River near the Town of Skowhegan is extremely important both as anarchitectural landmark and as a valuable historical site.

The house was built beginning in 1798 and was finally completed in 1800, by Samuel Weston. He was the son of Joseph Weston who settled Skowhegan in 1772. Samuel Weston led a distinguished career and is known primarily for his survey work in the area. His most important commission was the Bingham Purchase of which Samuel Weston and S. Titcomb made a survey of over a million acres for the Kennebec Proprietors and the Commonwealth of Massachuetts. Samuel Weston was also a leading citizen in the area of Skowhegan, serving as Captain of the Militia in 1785, and Justice of the Peace in the years of 1782,1787 and 1799. Finally he was appointed as the first postmaster of Canaan, the original name for Skowhegan. The history of the house and the role of the builder, Samuel Weston, in local affairs has been well documented.

The architectural significance of the house lies in the fact that it is a prime example of transitional Georgian to Federal style architecture. The holdover of Georgian features, particularly the south doorway and much of the interior, at this late date may well be due to the relative remoteness of the area and the resultant slowness of new stylistic trends to arrive.
