

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Located in Great Falls, South Carolina, the Republic Theater was built in 1921-1922 by the Republic Cotton Mills. The theater is thought to be the only facility of its architectural and historical type in Chester County.

Exterior: The Republic Theater is a rectangular block set on a closed foundation of limestone-colored stucco. The walls are constructed of light colored brick laid in stretcher, common, and diaper bond. The original roof was flat and consisted of tar and paper; however, this roof has collapsed competely, and at this time there is no covering over the building. The facade has a large segmental arch entrance framed by a terracotta bundled bay leaf torus, and soldier and rowlock surrounds with terra-cotta impost blocks. The facade is laid in diaper bond except for the parapet which is laid in common bond and topped with terra-cotta. A molded terra-cotta cornice which projects from the facade follows the curve of the arch and wraps around to the right elevation. The cornice is denticulated and has ornamental pendants and modillions. Two small rectangular windows with rowlock surrounds and terra-cotta corner blocks flank the entrance The area beneath the arch is divided into two stories. The lower story is brick and has two double entrances with metal doors. In the center is a boarded-up area which was once the ticket booth area. The original doors were wooden with ten mirror panes and a transom above. The second story of this area is concrete with one central This is where the marquee was located.

Interior: The interior of the theater has deteriorated greatly due to the collapse of the roof. The auditorium is full of the fallen roof and other debris. The wall covering is falling off and the pilaster capitals have crumbled. Originally, the theater had a two hundred seat auditorium, a lobby, restrooms, a projection room, a balcony, and a manager's office. The auditorium had a sloping concrete floor, a twenty-three foot stage with proscenium arch and two dressing rooms, which are largely intact but deteriorated. The walls of the auditorium were decorated with applied plaster molding around the furnace outlets and raised pilasters with Corinthian capitals.

Surroundings: The Republic Theater is located in a commercial setting in the downtown area of Great Falls. Flanking the building to the front is Dearborn Street. To the left and right of the theater are two commercial buildings, one two-story and one one-story. To the rear of the building is a gravel lot which is included in the nominated acreage. Across from the theater is a building complex which was also designed by the J. E. Serrine Company and was built ca. 1921.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Located in the town of Great Falls, South Carolina, the Republic Theater was built by Republic Cotton Mills in 1921-1922. The theater is significant for its association with local industry, theatrical entertainment, and for its fine architectural detail which distinguishes it as a local landmark.

In 1917 Republic Cotton Mills commissioned J. E. Serrine and Company, a Greenville, South Carolina, architectural firm, to complete architectural plans and specifications for the Republic Theater. Construction of the theater was completed in 1922. In 1946 Republic Cotton Mills sold much of its property, including the theater, to J. P. Stevens and Company, Inc. In 1949 Standard Amusement Company, Inc. of North Carolina purchased the theater from J. P. Stevens. Later that year, the theater was sold to Wayne Theaters of North Carolina. In 1978 Wayne Theaters donated the Republic Theater to the town of Great Falls after slow business forced the theater to close its doors for the last time in 1974.

Although the Republic Theater has been vacant for six years, the town of Great Falls recognizes the need to preserve this important historic site. In 1978 the town council established the Great Falls Historic Preservation Committee and authorized preparation of a National Register nomination for the theater as the committee's primary objective. In addition, the town has formulated long-range plans for the renovation of the theater for use as a local community center. Much local support has been forthcoming for the project and several local organizations and public agencies have expressed an interest in sharing the facility. Fortunately, the original plans for the theater are available to aid in restoration.

Industry: During the early 1900's, Republic Cotton Mills of New Jersey established a thriving textile industry in a rural area of Chester County which later developed into the town of Great Falls. Republic Cotton Mills, like many other textile manufacturers during the "New South" era, provided basic necessities and facilities to the surrounding mill village. In 1913 Republic Cotton Mills constructed the Old Falls Theater to provide the mill workers and their families with a permanent entertainment facility for traveling shows and silent movies. The Old Falls Theater, demolished during the 1920's, was the first theater in Great Falls. Due to the theater's popularity, Republic Cotton Mills had initiated plans to construct a larger and more attractive facility as early as 1917. In 1921-1922 the new Republic Theater was constructed according to architectural plans and specifications prepared by J. E. Serrine and Company of Greenville, South Carolina. This theater was the only building of its function or quality built by an industry for this region.

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
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Theater: The Republic Theater played an important role in providing entertainment and recreation for the people of Great Falls. Between the 1920's and the 1930's, the theater provided a variety of shows such as silent films, the first "talkies," minstrel shows, "blackface," and magic acts. The first movie to open at the theater was "The Kid" starring Charlie Chaplin. Films released by major distributors such as Paramount, Universal, and First National were purchased by the theater for approximately ten to twelve dollars apiece. Tickets to moviegoers sold for thiry-five cents each until the Great Depression. Attendance at the theater dwindled during the depression and postwar years due to economic circumstances and the advent of television and car use; consequently, the Republic Theater closed in 1974.

Architecture: The Republic Theater's significance is derived from its survival as the focal point of the downtown area in Great Falls. The Republic Theater is the most distinctive building in Great Falls due to such fine architectural details as the terracotta moulding and diaper bond brickwork.
