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SUMMARY

The Thomas R. Ayer House is a c1885, two-and-one-half story, Queen Anne influenced frame vernacular building, located west of the community of Oklawaha, near the northeast shore of Lake Weir. It is an irregularly massed, balloon framed building resting on brick piers. The architectural integrity of the house is excellent; with the exception of some upgrading and remodeling of kitchens and baths, it is has been little altered since it was originally constructed. It contributes to the **Early Residences** of Rural Marion County, Florida Multiple Property Listing under Associated Property Type F.1 Residential Buildings, c1870-c1940.

SETTING

When the Thomas R. Ayer House was built, the land surrounding it was planted in orange grove and sparsely populated. Buildings were limited to several scattered grove houses and outbuildings and a few lakeside cottages. The local meeting house of the Chautauqua Society bordered the property to the southwest, but has since been demolished.

The Ayer House is 250 yards from Lake Weir and approximately the same distance from U.S. Alternate 27 and 441 (Marion County Road 25). It borders S.E. 119th Court (the Old Lake Weir Road) on its southeast side. The lot on which the building is sited is almost perfectly square and covers slightly more than an acre. Until the mid-1980s the surrounding acreage was planted in citrus grove. The grove was decimated by harsh freezes at that time and has been cleared. Much of the original grove land, particularly that on the lake, has been subdivided into one to two acre lots.

PRESENT AND ORIGINAL PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

EXTERIOR

The exterior finish of the Thomas R. Ayer House is horizontal, wood, weatherboard. The building has a variety of roof forms, most of which are gabled, with various degrees of pitch. Other types of roofs and roof features include a gable dormer, a flat roof, pent roof, and shed roofs. Both primary and secondary roof surfaces are covered by galvanized sheet metal in a V-crimp pattern. The roof is pierced by two brick, corbelled chimneys on the north and west sides of the building, and an

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exterior brick chimney is located on the east side of the rear addition.

The <u>main (S) elevation</u> has three irregular bays (Photo 1). The west bay has two and a half stories with a front gabled roof. The first story level is distinguished by a three-sided, flat roofed projecting bay. Each face of the bay has a 2/2, double hung sash, wooden window. At the second story level, double French doors open onto the balustraded roof of the bay. A pent roof supported by brackets shelters and accents the doorway. A small, square 2/2, double hung sash window is located near the peak of the gable which is distinguished by decorative verge board.

The central bay is a three story tower above the recessed main entrance (Photo 3). The upper stories are marked by single, 2/2 double hung sash windows flanked by louvered shutters (Photo 1). A two story, screened porch sheltered by a large shed roof forms the eastern bay and carries elaborate jig-sawn balusters and a frieze (Photo 2).

The <u>east elevation</u> (Photo 4) reveals the gabled end of the east wing with single, 2/2 double hung sash windows at each story and decorative verge board at the peak of the gable. The rear unadorned portions of the house have low pitched shed roofs which graduate down to a one story, gable roofed outbuilding connected to the main house by a breezeway.

The rear (N) elevation (Photo 5) has an open attached porch. The roof is irregular with various roof levels and features. The three brick chimneys are visible from the rear. A one story wing, perpendicular to the rear of the house, appears to have been originally a detached kitchen or servants' quarters (Photo 6).

INTERIOR

The first floor of the Thomas Ayer House has a central hall which provides access to a parlor or living room, family room, dining room, kitchen, and bath. At the rear is a wing which is finished as an efficiency. The downstairs contains two fireplaces with decorative mantels (Photo 7), and a number of original ceiling features (Photo 8). A centrally placed stairway (Photo 9) with a turned newel post and delicate balusters leads to the second floor which contains three large bedrooms and a

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bath. The floor plan is also organized around a central hall which contains a continuation of the stair rail system from below (Photo 10). The second floor also contains two fireplaces with mantels and original ceiling features (Photo 11). The upper half-story attic space has an open plan used for a den and bedroom.

Throughout most of the house is four inch wide heart pine, tongue and groove flooring. Bathrooms and kitchens have vinyl flooring and the hallway is asbestos tile. Wall finishes are plaster over lathe. Molded trim around windows, doors, and baseboards is found throughout the house. Transom lights are located above doorways.

ALTERATIONS

The exterior of the building is remarkably unchanged. The major alteration has been the replacement of the original wood roof shingles with sheet metal. This alteration was probably undertaken early in the century and has gained a significance in its own right.

The interior also has excellent integrity. The principal alterations have been to floor surfaces, where vinyl has covered the original wood flooring. Bathrooms were added early in the century.

SUMMARY

The Thomas R. Ayer House, built c1885 and located in the vicinity of Oklawaha, Marion County, Florida, is significant at the local level under Criterion A in the areas of Exploration & Settlement because of its association with the early development of Oklawaha and Marion County. It is also locally significant under Criterion C as an unusual application of Queen Anne architectural details to a basically vernacular residential building. The Thomas R. Ayer House contributes to the Early Residences of Rural Marion County, Florida Multiple Property Listing under Associated Context: Marion County, 1847-1900 and Associated Property Type: Residential Buildings, c1870-c1940.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Thomas R. Ayer House was constructed c1885, shortly after the settlement of Oklawaha, near the northwest shore of Lake Weir. Oklawaha was first settled in 1884, following the construction of the Florida Southern Railway through the area in 1883. Oklawaha became one of the principal citrus producing communities in Marion County.

Although the property is known as the Ayer House, property records indicate the original owners of the building were actually L. J. and Lucy Parr who bought the land from General Robert Bullock in 1885. By 1887, the Parrs had conveyed the parcel, with the building apparently already constructed, to Thomas Ayer.

Thomas Ayer was one of the pioneer citrus growers of Marion County. He arrived in the county c1880 from Charleston, South Carolina, with other family members, Dr. Lewis M. Ayer and Alfred Ayer. All of the Ayers were prominently associated with the development of citrus at Lake Weir, and all constructed elaborate houses on or near the northwest shore of the lake. Thomas Ayer also was politically prominent, serving on the Marion County Commission in the late nineteenth century.

In 1889, Ayer sold the house to Enoch W. Agnew, owner of E. W. Agnew and Company, one of Marion County's most important mercantile and banking establishments. During the 20th century, the Ayer House has had numerous owners.

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The Thomas R. Ayer House is architecturally significant as the best example of the Queen Anne style in rural Marion County. Typical features of the style which the house incorporates include irregular massing and roof lines, projecting bays, and highly decorative woodwork, such as brackets and verge boards. The period of significance is c1885 to 1889, from the time it was built through the time it was associated with Thomas Ayer, a citrus pioneer of Marion County.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION


The boundaries of the Thomas R. Ayer House are roughly square, measuring approximately 210' by 210'. They are more particularly described as parcel #45014, Marion County Property Appraiser's records. The property is bounded on the southwest by S.E. 119th Court; from S.E. 119th Court, the boundary proceeds northwest 210'; thence southwest 210'; thence southeast 210' to S.E. 119th Street; thence northeast along S.E. 119th Street to the point of beginning.


BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION


