#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located on the Union Central Road approximately three miles north of Milan (pop. 8,135), Tennessee, the Union Central School is a two story double walled red sand brick building. Constructed in the Summer of 1914, the school is roughly square in shape, fifty feet wide and sixty feet long. Fenestration on the hipped roof school is comprised of multi-pane windows with segmental rowlock arch lintels. Three wood outbuildings are included on the nominated property. The interior and exterior of the Union Central School have remained relatively unchanged. The school has retained much of its architectural integrity.

The south (front) facade is four bays wide with a paneled double door located near the center of the first story. Four windows with segmental rowlock arch brick lintels and brick sills are located on the second story and three windows are found on the first story. Originally all windows were 6/6 double hung sash windows but some are now 1/6 double hung sash windows or have been boarded over. The main door is capped by a transom window and a brick lintel. Wood braces support the shed roof porch over the main door. A projecting brick stringcourse is located beneath the second story windows.

The east and west facades of the school are symmetrically designed with six bays of windows on each story. These windows are identical to those on the south facade although many are now 1/6 double hung sash windows or have been boarded over. The second story stringcourse is contiguous along these sides and the north side of the school. The north facade is delineated by four bays of the same multi-pane windows that are found on the other facades. The first story has only two windows but two entries are located at this level. The paneled wood doors are surmounted by segmental arch brick lintels.

Interior walls are plastered and have beaded wainscoting and wood chair rails. The inside doors are paneled and have plain surrounds. Three classrooms, a large entrance hall (once used as a cloakroom) and the original staircase are located on the first story. The second story is an open area with an elevated stage and dressing rooms. Few interior alterations have occurred. Only one wall was cut through and the first story floors were replaced.

The school is located on a flat lot and surrounded by large (mainly pine) trees with no shrubbery located near the building. A circular gravel drive leads to the school from the road. Two small wood privies and a wood coal shed are located on the nominated property as is a new concrete outbuilding. A horse shed, pump house, music building and teachers' house once stood on the property but are now non-extant.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Union Central School is being nominated under National Register criterion A for its significance in the educational history of the rural area north of Milan, Tennessee. Constructed in the summer of 1914, the school resulted from the consolidation of two small rural schools. By consolidating, the larger school could provide a more comprehensive education and improved facilities for students in the surrounding rural area. The Union Central School has undergone few alterations and has retained much of its historical and architectural integrity.

Like many other rural areas of Tennessee in the late 1800s and early 1900s, the area north of Milan, Tennessee had two small one room, one teacher schools. One was located in Oakwood, Tennessee and the other in Cades, Tennessee. Alvin Hassell, the Gibson County State Representative, and Curt Horton, a member of the Gibson County School Board, saw the need to consolidate the two schools. Under their impetus the County School Board purchased 7 4/5 acres of land and began construction of a new school. The name Union Central School originated from combining the names of the two small schools.

The Union Central School was constructed using local labor. Although no document has been found which records a building architect, it is probable that the design was a combined effort of the men of the community including two local brick masons, Raymond and Herman Creswell. Their father Jim Creswell owned and operated a brick yard in Milan. The sand for the mortor and plaster was hauled from a field off Gillion's lease, three miles away, by wagon and mule teams. Robert Seats was employed to do the plaster work. He boarded with one of the families of the community while he did the work. The bricks used to construct the school were hauled by local wagon and mule teams, a distance of three miles. The second story of the school was not completed until 1915.

The first classes were held at the school in November, 1914. The new school usually contained students in grades one through eight but at one time housed students from grades one through eleven. Students came to Union Central School from the nearby communities of Concord, Salem, Davidson Chapel, Gann, and Moore's Chapel. A large barn (non-extant) was constructed to hold the horses and buggies of the students. The largest total enrollment in the school was sixty-five students. Classes were held here until 1954 when improved roads and school busses brought students into Milan for classes.


In 1955, the school and land was purchased by the Union Central Community Club for use as a community center. Since then the club has sold off almost five acres of land and residences are now located on either side of the school. Still used as a community center, the Union Central School is an historically significant representation of a regional school in rural West Tennessee.
