Narrative Description

Roosevelt State Park is located three miles south of Morton, Mississippi on Highway 80 in Scott County. This park consists of five hundred fifty acres of which approximately twenty are included in this nomination. Roosevelt State Park was the seventh of ten state parks in Mississippi developed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC occupied the site from August 1935 to the park's opening in April 1940. Nine park cabins, a park pavilion, and a few landscape features such as stainwells and culverts were built by the CCC. The buildings are designed in the popular Rustic style of architecture commonly found in state park construction. The Rustic style of architecture emphasized local materials that would allow buildings and structures to blend with their natural surroundings. Standardized plans were developed by the National Park Service for the layout and construction of park facilities throughout the United States.

The Roosevelt State Park Historic District is characterized by its gently rolling hills, adjoining one hundred fifty acre lake, and nine buildings that face a curvilinear paved drive emphasizing its scenic beauty. In order to further blend the man-made landscape with the natural one, all buildings and structures from the CCC era were designed in the Rustic style of architecture. Although many of the original screened porches have been enclosed, the buildings all retain their basic forms, interior and exterior materials, and sense of place.

The park retains a high degree of its overall historic and architectural integrity. However, the majority of the CCC resources are limited to only twenty acres of the park. The other park buildings date from the 1950s and 1980s and are not included in this nomination. However, it is important to note that the newer buildings do not distract from the landscape and use similar materials. The Roosevelt State Park Historic District contains eleven historic resources that contribute to its architectural and historical character. All contributing elements are identified with the notation "C." The designed landscape of the park is another contributing element and is noted in the inventory.

01 C Cabin Number 1

This is a symmetrical, one-story, three-bay, wood frame, side gabled house situated on a stone foundation with a tar-shingle roof. The facade is characterized by its centrally placed vertical plank door with one-light and screen door that is flanked by a grouping of three four-light louvered windows set into wooden frame (PHOTO #1).

02 C Cabin Number 2

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, four-bay, wood frame, gable-front-and-wing house situated on stone piers with concrete block in-fill and topped with a tar-shingle roof. The facade is dominated by its gable-front screened porch. The facade reads single window, paired window, door, paired window. The single window is a three-light, casement set into a wooden frame while the paired windows are four-light casements with similar frames. The entrance is marked by a vertical plank door that is obscured by the enclosed screened porch (PHOTO #2)

03 C Cabin Number 3

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, three-bay, wood frame, side gabled house situated on a poured concrete foundation and topped with a tar-shingle roof. The roof line is tripartite with lower sections flanking the higher central portion. On the northern half of the building, a four-stepped wooden staircase leads to a screened porch entrance. The southern half of the building has one three-light window set into a wooden frame. The central section of the building is characterized by its grouping of three four-light casement windows with wooden frames (PHOTO #3).

04 C Cabin Number 4

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, two-bay, wood frame, gabled-front-and-wing house. The building is on a poured concrete foundation and topped with a tar-shingle roof. There are two gabled-front windows both are four-light, casement windows set into wooden frames. On the northern side of the gabled-front is a screen porch entrance (PHOTO #4 and 5).

05 C Cabin Number 5

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, three-bay, wood frame, side gabled house with a poured concrete foundation and a tarshingle roof. The entrance is marked by three-stepped wooden staircase and a vertical plank wood with one-light screen door. The entrance is flanked by a single, four-light, six-over-six double-hung sash window set into a wooden frame and an upper sash, two-light casement window (PHOTO #6).

06 NC Cabin Number 6

This is a one-story, six-bay, wood-framed duplex cabin with a concrete foundation and asphalt shingles on the roof. The facade is sided with pressed wood clapboard siding and reads window, door, window, window, door, window. A screened porch runs the entire length of the facade. The building is side gabled with a change in pitch over the porch. There are wooden louvered vents at the peak of the gable end. Both entrances are three-light-and-panel doors.

07 C Cabin Number 7

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, four-by-two-bay, wood frame, side-gabled house with a limestone pier foundation with concrete block in-fill and topped with a tar shingle roof. The facade reads door, paired window, upper sash window, paired window. The gable elevation has a door and paired window. All doors are vertical planks with one-light screened fronts, projecting wooden awnings, and three-stepped wooden staircases leading to them. The paired windows on the facade are four-light, casement windows with wooden frames while the gable side windows are replacement four-over-four double-hung sash windows. The upper sash window is characterized by its two-lights and sliding casement (PHOTO #7).

08 NC Cabin Number 8

This is a one-story, L-shaped, three-bay building with modem vertical wooden paneling and a concrete foundation. The facade reads window, door, window. The building has a gable roof with an offset pitch on the north side. The offset projection has sliding windows that open into the living area. All other windows are modem one-over-one aluminum with wood frames. The screened porch projects out from the L, to create a rectangular shape, but is recessed under the same roof. There is a round, metal chimney at the peak of the gable, just off the projection.

09 C Cabin Number 9

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, four-bay, wood frame, side-gabled house with a poured concrete foundation and topped with a tar shingle roof. The facade reads paired window, single upper sash window, door, paired window. The windows have all been replaced with six-over-six double-hung sashes set into the historic frames; however the easternmost set of windows seems to have once been a grouping of three since the dimensions of the replacement windows are different from the other historic sets. The entrance retains its original vertical plank door with screen front and projecting wooden awning (PHOTO #8).

10 C Cabin Number 10

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, three-bay, wooden frame, side-gabled house that rests on brick piers with concrete block infill and topped by a tar shingle roof. The facade is characterized by its screened porch that obscures its vertical plank door and set of four-light, double-hung sash windows. The exposed facade windows are three-light, double-hung sash windows placed into wooden frames. The rear of the building also has a screened porch given this building a configuration similar to a galleried planters' cottage and not the standardized CCC floor plan (PHOTO #9).

11 C Cabin Number 11

This is an asymmetrical, one-story, two-bay, wooden frame, side-gabled house that rests on a poured concrete foundation and topped by a tar shingle roof. The facade is characterized by its partial screened porch that obscures the entrance. The entrance is tripartite with a centrally located door flanked by eight-over-eight double-hung sash windows all set into wooden frames. The visible bay is characterized by paired three-light, double-hung sash windows set into wooden frames. Similar to Cabin Number 9, this too has more of a regional, planter's cottage floor plan with its front and rear screened porches (PHOTO #10).

12 NC Cabin Number 12

Identical to Cabin Number 8, but reversed plan. This is a one-story, L-shaped, three-bay building with modern vertical wooden siding and a concrete foundation. The facade reads window, door, window. The building has a gable roof with an offset pitch on the north side. The offset projection has sliding windows that are open into the living area. All other windows are modern one-over-one aluminum with wood frames. The screened porch projects out from the L, to create a rectangular shape, but is recessed under the same roof. There is a round, metal chimney at the peak of the gable, just off the projection.

13 NC Cabin Number 13

This is a one-story, U-shaped, six-bay building with modern vertical wooden siding and a concrete foundation. The facade reads window, door, window, door, window. The building has a gable roof with an offset pitch on the north side. The offset projection has sliding windows that open into the living area. All other windows are one-over-one aluminum with wood frames. There are two round, metal chimneys at the center of the building, just off the projection. Each of the entrances is a single-leaf wooden door. The screened porch projects out from the U to create a rectangular shape, but is recessed under the same roof.

14 C Park Pavilion

This is an open timber frame structure with a concrete slab floor that is approximately 100' x 100' and is characterized by its timber rafters that support a shed roof covered with tar shingles. The pavilion is well-intact and retains its historic built-in benches on the circumference of the building (PHOTO #11 and 12)

15 C Park Landscape

This is a designed landscape that emphasizes the scenic beauty of the park's terrain. Notable features include clearly planned paved drives that are curvilinear in shape and lead to vistas, lakes, and park service facilities. The general characteristics of the park landscape include a few remaining limestone staircases and paved or dirt trails that do not distract from the natural environment. The CCC strove to make non-intrusive man-made landscapes. Roosevelt State Park is an example of this philosophy. (PHOTO #13)

Statement of Significance

The proposed Roosevelt State Park Historic District has local and statewide significance under Criterion A in the areas of entertainment and recreation and social history, and under Criterion C in the areas of architecture and landscape architecture. The period of significance extends from 1934 to 1942. The historical development of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) is discussed in detail in the MPS "State Parks in Mississippi built by the CCC between 1934-1942." Roosevelt State Park Historic District is an example of one of the ten new parks built in Mississippi by the CCC and placed under the supervision of the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

The CCC administered a variety of programs including road, park, and defense construction, reforestation, and erosion control, as well as many other projects. The effects of this agency on the man-made landscape are overwhelming. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt established the CCC as part of his New Deal program to help combat the economical hardships of the depression (see the MPS cover document for a detailed analysis on pages 3-5).

The CCC used standardized plans for park layout to created regional interpretations that would blend into the natural surroundings. Roosevelt State Park Historic District was the seventh park in Mississippi created by the CCC. The CCC began working in 1935 and opened the park to the public in April 1940.¹ The CCC workers transformed the natural landscape with man-made roads, walking trails, cabins, and other necessary park facilities thus combining national agendas with regional materials and surroundings. These changes included the construction of Alfreda Lodge, a hand-hewn log structure that was the focal point of the facilities. The lodge was destroyed by fire in 1978.

All buildings within the district are constructed in the Rustic style and blend nicely into their environment. Although many of the original screened porches have been enclosed, the buildings all retain their basic forms, interior and exterior materials, and sense of place.

Additional Registration Requirements

The registration requirements for listing of Roosevelt State Park Historic District have been discussed in the cover document. However, because of their brevity, it has been determined that in order to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places as a part of the "State Parks in Mississippi built by the CCC between 1934-1942" multiple property submission, a state park historic district must meet these additional registration requirements.

1. It must be or have been a Mississippi State Park developed by the CCC between 1932 to 1942.

2. It must retain, within the proposed district boundaries, a high degree of historical integrity from the period of its construction. it must retain most of its historic buildings, and they must retain a high degree of integrity of design, location, craftsmanship, and materials. It must retain its major landscape features, including lakes, woodlands, CCC-built walks, steps, and other structures, as well as the basic arrangement of roads and trails.

3. Areas of these parks not historically associated with the CCC or developed after that period will be excluded whenever possible from the boundaries of the historic district.
