DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Post Office was contracted to Dieter & Wenzil Company of Joplin, Missouri. Construction began October 1, 1912, was completed September 1, 1913 - at a cost of \$46,000. The site is approximately 156 x 135 feet, fronting east on Main Street. The building itself, also fronting on Main, is 80 x 46 feet.

Of buff-colored stucco with a red-tile roof, the Post Office sits well off the ground, over a full basement that accommodates boiler, fuel, janitor, and storage rooms. On the main floor the high-ceilinged work area is flanked by mezzanines on either side. These mezzanines are delineated by broad projecting sections on the front exterior. Within these projected wall sections the strongly classic main entrance is divided into thirds by four three-quarter-height pilasters topped by modified Ionic capitals.

One other distinguishing architectural feature would be the rather massive cornice brackets that carry the overhanging hipped roof on all four sides. Simulated keystones feature the window cornices. Otherwise the building is relatively unornamented and not unhandsome.

Back of the building is quite plain, with a crude box-like shelter built over the loading platform and rear entrance. Balance of the site is paved for parking.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The area surrounding Kingfisher was well known long before "Old Oklahoma" was opened to settlement by "run" on April 22, 1889. The storied Chisholm Trail ran just east of the town site. The town itself was laid out on land of a cattleman named King Fisher, who had also operated a stage line and maintained a stage station. Government officials designated the town-to-be as location for a land office where claimants to land "won" in the run could file their claims.

Kingfisher was thus off to something of a federally-sanctioned head start and it made the most of it, becoming in early Oklahoma Territory days one of northwestern Oklahoma's most important towns. It boasted respected Kingfisher College for a number of years. And for a time it nurtured dreams of wrestling the capital from Guthrie. In 1892 the Oklahoma (Territory) Press Association was organized there, which group in turn established the Oklahoma Historical Society. In 1892, too, Judge Abraham J. Seay, whose jurisdiction extended as far to the north and west as the Oklahoma Panhandle, was appointed the second governor of Oklahoma Territory.

From 1889 to the present one patch of ground in Kingfisher has been intimately associated with the growth and development of the town - the northwest corner of the intersection of Main and Robberts. This so-called "Government Acre" was reserved for official use and it has remained federal property ever since. On the site was erected the Government Land Office - a plain, false-fronted frame building, completed just in time to open its doors April 23. The "run" for land began at noon on April 22. That night a long line of homesteaders began to form, hoping to be among the first to file with government registrars. When the office opened on April 23, Kingfisher (and several other Oklahoma Territory registry points) had a "land office rush" - and the English language had a picturesque new expression.

With the land office the Government Acre soon accommodated the post office. The town's first postmaster arrived April 29, a week after the run. He set up shop in a tent near the land office. For a short period postal service was transferred to a frame building across the street. By the turn of the century, however, the post office moved back onto the Government Acre - into a one-story brick building erected beside the frame land office. Both were torn down to make way for a new Post Office. Moved into Sept. 15, 1913, it is the still handsome two-story structure now being nominated. It served continuously until 1976, when a larger facility was opened.

The Post Office building and the Government Acre on which it stands have thus together spanned the entire 88-year history of Kingfisher. South edge of the property

is marked by Robberts Avenue, honoring Jacob C. Robberts of David City, Nebraska, appointed Register of the U. S. land office for the Western District of Oklahoma. Also in Kingfisher is Admire Avenue, for the land office's first Receiver, Jacob V. Admire of Osage City, Kansas.

If the City of Kingfisher is successful in its attempt to acquire the now empty Post Office building, it plans to move into it the city library, now occupying cramped quarters in City Hall. Then, fittingly enough, Government Acre would again be serving the Kingfisher area in yet another way as it has now for nearly a century.
