NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Cave Hill National Cemetery consists of six burial sections in the northwest corner of the 300-acre privately-owned Cave Hill Cemetery, 701 Baxter Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky, about two miles from the center of the city. A wrought-iron gate supported by brick piers is located in the northwest corner at Payne Street, but is not used by the public as an entrance gate. When visiting the national cemetery, one must enter the Cave Hill Cemetery. A flagpole, constructed circa 1898, is located in the northeastern portion of the national cemetery. At the base of the flagpole is a bronze plaque inscribed with "Cave Hill National Cemetery" and the seal of the Veterans Administration (now the Department of Veterans Affairs). Near the center of the north boundary of the national cemetery is a rostrum situated to the side of a lily pond.

Graves were originally marked by painted and numbered headboards, which were later replaced with upright marble headstones. The cemetery closed in 1939 for interment of casketed remains. As of February 28, 1998, there were 5,633 sites used for the interment of 5,709 casketed remains and 174 sites used for the interment of 181 cremated remains. As of February 28, 1998, there were 3 gravesites available (reserved) for the interment of casketed remains and 50 sites available for the interment of cremated remains.

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The stone rostrum, 22 feet by 36 feet, with concrete columns, was constructed in 1898. The floor and steps are concrete. The open trellis roof was removed circa 1955.

There is one commemorative monument within the Cave Hill National Cemetery:

GERMAN MONUMENT - A stone tablet mounted on a solid stone pedestal. The base of the monument is 16 inches wide, 67 inches long, and 8 inches above ground. The inscription in German is illegible, but documents in National Cemetery System records state that the inscription, transcribed into English, reads as follows:

HERE REST THE FIRST HEROES OF THE 32ND INDIANA GERMAN REGIMENT WHO LAID DOWN THEIR LIVES FOR PRESERVATION OF THE FREE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF NORTH AMERICA. THEY WERE KILLED DECEMBER 17, 1861, IN A FIGHT WITH THE REBELS AT ROWLETT'S STATION, KENTUCKY, IN WHICH ONE REGIMENT TEXAS RANGERS, TWO REGIMENTS OF INFANTRY, AND A BATTERY OF SIX CANNON, OVER 3,000 STRONG, WERE DEFEATED BY 500 GERMAN SOLDIERS.

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NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cave Hill National Cemetery is significant under Criterion A and is an important component of the multiple property submission of Civil War Era National Cemeteries. It is significant under Criterion A because of its association with the Civil War. The cemetery is also significant beyond the Civil War era, as it includes the remains of veterans associated with many wars and all branches of service who had served their country throughout its history.

This national cemetery meets the registration requirements of the multiple property nomination of Civil War Era National Cemeteries, but does not have a fence or wall enclosing the national cemetery proper. The privately-owned Cave Hill Cemetery is enclosed.

A variety of ways was considered to end the period of significance. Since the contributing resources date as far back as 1904, and a reasonable date could not be defined to end the period, the date of 1948 (50 years ago) was used.

Original interments were made from deaths in the hospitals established at Louisville and from troops encamped in the neighborhood. In the spring of 1867, additional interments were made of the dead gathered up at various points on the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, as far south as Rowlett's

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Station and from points on the Kentucky side of the Ohio River as far down as Henderson. Bodies were removed from the following locations:

Munfordville in McCracken County

Woodville and its vicinity in McCracken County

Shepardsville and its vicinity in Bullitt County

Vicinity of Red Mills

Elizabethtown in Hardin County

Belmont in Bullitt County

Vicinity of Colesburg

Nolans Station and its vicinity

Sonora and its vicinity

Henderson in Henderson County

Owensborough in Daviess County

Several other places

A former superintendent of the Cave Hill National Cemetery, H. M. Fogg, is buried in Section B opposite the flagpole. His monument is inscribed as follows:

There are 37 Confederate soldiers buried in the cemetery.

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A lodge was situated outside of and a short distance from the main entrance to the Cave Hill Cemetery on a lot purchased by the United States in 1867 and known as 1309 Baxter Avenue. It was a one-and one-half-story brick cottage, with a basement. A kitchen and porch were sometime prior to 1934. It was enclosed with an iron fence. An inspector's report states that the superintendent of the civil cemetery rented the lodge for \$10 per month in consideration of his keeping the graves of Union soldiers in good order. This measure had been disapproved of by the Quartermaster General. In addition, a shop and garage were located at 637 Baxter Avenue. This wooden structure, 36 feet by 16 ¼ feet, with a brick foundation and tin roof, contained three rooms. Both these buildings were sold when the lot containing them was sold at public auction on November 16, 1938, to the Highland Company of Louisville, Kentucky, as authorized by Act of August 10, 1937 (Public Law 250, 75th Congress).

On September 11, 1861, the War Department directed, in General Orders No. 75, that commanding officers of military corps and departments were responsible for the burial of any officer or soldier who died within their jurisdiction. Partial expedients were sought by acquiring soldiers' plots in cemeteries near large general hospitals, where a far greater number of men were destined to die than fell on the battlefield. Many cemeterial associations performed a patriotic service by donating plots for Army burials.

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In 1861, the Cave Hill Cemetery Company donated to the United States a parcel of land, consisting of 0.65 acre, (now Section A) dedicated to the burial of soldiers who should die in the service of the United States. This donation was later confirmed by deed dated March 23, 1877, from Mr. Bland Ballard, President of the Cave Hill Cemetery Company. The national cemetery was not actually established until 1863. By deeds dated July 23, 1863, and May 30, 1864, Mr. Isaac Everett, President of the Cave Hill Cemetery Company, conveyed to the United States 0.96 acre (Section B) for \$10,528.50, and 1.26 acres (Sections C and D), for \$13,113.75. These three sections are located along Cypress and Maple Avenues. In 1867, 0.22 acre, located a short distance north of the main entrance to the cemetery was acquired by purchase from Mr. Ward Payne and wife, for the sum of \$1,325, and was to be used as the site for a superintendent's lodge. By deed dated June 4, 1868, a parcel containing 0.11 acre (Section E) was purchased from the Cave Hill Cemetery Company. An additional 0.36 acre of land was purchased from the Cave Hill Cemetery Company in 1893. A site, consisting of 0.5 acre, was donated by the Cave Hill Cemetery Company in 1897 to be used as the site for a permanent rostrum, with the express condition that such portion of the land which may lie outside and beyond the boundaries of the rostrum shall not be reserved for burial but shall be reserved and held for planting and ornamental purposes and subject to the rules and regulations of the Cave Hill Cemetery Company.

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The War Department had not intended to purchase additional land for burials after existing graves were filled, but upon pressure from various local veterans' organizations, additional land was purchased. A land exchange was accomplished in 1910, under the authority of the act of March 12, whereby 0.07 acre was acquired from the Cave Hill Cemetery Company in exchange for 0.04 acre. In 1912, an additional 0.71 acre was purchased. Under provisions of Public Law 250, approved August 10, 1937, the Secretary of War was authorized to sell the 0.22 acre site on which the superintendent's lodge was located. The total area of the national cemetery is 4.1 acres.

The Cave Hill Cemetery was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on December 11, 1979. The national cemetery is only briefly mentioned in this nomination.






