The Haskell-Long House is a two-story Frame Vernacular residential building at 3858 Main Street, Middleburg, Florida. Its significant architectural features include a steeply-pitched, side gabled roof with enclosed eaves, a hip roofed end porch, a large random field stone fireplace and end, exterior chimney.

PRESENT AND ORIGINAL PHYSICAL APPEARANCE:

The Haskell-Long House is a two-story Frame Vernacular residential building, situated on a two hundred foot square lot on the north side of Main Street. The lot is dotted with shrubs and oak trees.

The building features an L-shaped plan, consisting of a main block with side gable roofed and a rear gable roofed extension. The roofs have 3-V crimp sheet metal surfacing. The building is clad with drop, or novelty wood siding which has never been painted. The fenestration of the main facade (south elevation) consists of a central panelled door flanked by evenly spaced double hung sash windows with 2/2 lights. A one story, hip roofed veranda wraps around the front and east sides of the building. The porch roof is supported by chamfered posts, and the deck is wood plank (photo 1). The gable end sides of the house (photo 2) also have two double-hung sash windows on both levels of the house. The west elevation has the most notable feature of the exterior, a random, field stone chimney (photo 2). The rear (north) elevation features a one-story hipped extension. The only significant alteration to the exterior of the building is a small shed roofed room addition to the rear gable extension (photo 3).

The interior of the house retains many of its original features. The interior wall fabric is rough, horizontal drop-siding (photos 4 and 6). The living room is dominated by a large field stone fireplace (photo 4). A stairway with a hand-hewn newel post and balustrade is located in the central hall (photo 5).

The Haskell-Long House is significant under Criterion C as a good example of Frame Vernacular architecture, and as one of the few and best preserved extant buildings that date from the Steamboat Era of development in Middleburg (see the Middleburg multiple property group cover, Section E). The building was constructed c1890 when Middleburg was at the height of its importance as a steamboat port on the St. Johns River system. . It is consistent with the criteria established in the associated property type, Wood Frame Buildings of Middleburg (see the Middleburg multiple property group cover, Section F).

Historic Significance:

The Haskell-Long House is one of only a few extant structures dating from the Steamboat Era of development in Middleburg, 1865-1915. The building was constructed as a private residence by Ferdinand L. Haskell c1890. Haskell sold the property to Edward W. Long on November 13, 1895. The house remained in the Long family until the late 1970's.

Architectural Significance

The Haskell-Long house is an excellent representation of vernacular building trends. It is consistent in its materials, scale, and design with typical examples of rural frame vernacular architecture of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. A product of its environment, the Haskell-Long House was constructed utilizing a simple design and materials that were available locally. The building's high degree of architectural integrity marks it as one of the finest surviving examples of historic vernacular architecture in Middleburg.
