Rogers, who worked for Central of Georgia Railroad, lived at 1617 3rd Ave. From 1898-99, Marion Mote, a moulder for Goldens' Foundry and Machine Works, lived here with his wife, Rebecca. By 1900, another railroad worker, Joseph Pruett, was here with his wife, Effie.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Local History: This house is significant as it was inhabited by various common laborers shortly after its construction. The house was apparently built for individuals who worked in and around local railroads, foundries, and the like. Architecture: This house is significant as it represents housing tastes popular among the lower to middle income black workers in Columbus. Conservative and economical to build, the builder added a bit of gingerbread to make it adapt to popular styles.
