Lewis owned and operated the bus service between Clarkesville and nearby Cornelia for years; later extending the line into North Carolina. Lewis and his wife continue to reside in the structure.

IV. SIGNIFICANCE	STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecturally, this house is significant as an excellent intact local example of the early 20th century Craftsman- style Bungalow residence. Characteristic features include its low massing, asymmetrical arrangement of gables, brick construction, and Craftsman detailing in brackets, rafter ends, gables, and windows. Its linear floor plan is suggestive of the ranch house, which succeeded the Bungalow as America's popular medium-priced house. In terms of transportation, this house is significant as the home of J.A. Lewis, owner and operator of a pioneering interurban bus line in Habersham County during the 1920's and (CONTD)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

1930's. Although Clarkesville was the county seat, nearby Cornelia, with its trunk rail and highway connections, was the commercial center of the county, and the Lewis Bus Line provided convenient transportation between the two.
