Describe present and historic physical appearance:

Summary

Located on the corner of Capitol and Kate Adams Streets in Arkansas City, Desha County, the Xenophon Overton Pindall Law Office is a single-story, red brick commercial building constructed around 1882 in the Italianate manner. Like other commercial buildings from this era, all of the windows and doors are capped by segmental arches. The bricks used in the construction of the building are reported to be made out of local clay. The building rests on a continuous foundation of brick and contains a partial basement. The X. O. Pindall Law Office is currently undergoing restoration. The original design of the front and rear porches has been reconstructed from historic photographs and examining the indications on the surrounding brick that note the size and shape of the supports. Although the interior is stripped of plaster, it retains all original window and door moldings, as well as a centrally located brick fireplace.

Elaboration

The X. O. Pindall Law Office is a single-story, red brick commercial building constructed around 1882. The building rests on a continuous brick foundation with a partial basement. The fenestration of the entire building is composed of one-over-one, double-hung, wood windows capped by segmental brick arches. The windows and doors have a wooden infill above them to fill the space between the top of the rectangular windows and the segmental arches. Differing patterns of brick embellish the corniced parapets along the three principal elevations. The cornice rests on a plain frieze denoted by a double stringcourse. Above the frieze the cornice is composed of a decorative corbeled course of brick separated from the dentil course by another stringcourse. Concealed by the parapets is a flat tar roof. The reconstructed porches are covered by corrugated metal roofs with exposed rafter ends.

The front, or southeastern, elevation is dominated by a raised, hipped-roof porch supported by turned spindle posts. The posts are adorned with simple jigsawn ornaments. Connecting the posts are turned spindle balustrades. Eight wooden stairs, flanked by matching balustrades, lead up to this porch. The porch rests on a masonry pier foundation and has a wooden deck. Beneath the porch are a pair of windows with a single large segmental arch above them. Beside the windows the entrance to the building, which is a four-panel wood door topped by a single light transom and brick arch.

The side, or southwestern, elevation is fenestrated by four equally spaced one-over-one windows above two small wooden vents that are also capped by segmental arches.

The rear, or northwestern, elevation contains a porch, which unlike the front porch is raised on wooden piers and features a wooden staircase that runs parallel the elevation. It has simple square posts and is covered by a shed roof. Beneath the porch is one window next to the entrance.

The other side, or northeastern, elevation contains no windows, doors or cornice ornamentation.

There are no outbuildings associated with this property.

Summary

The Xenphon Overton Pindall Law Office is being nominated to the National Register under Criteria B and C with local significance for its association with Governor Pindall and as an excellent example of a 1880s single-story commercial building constructed in the Italianate manner.

Elaboration

In 1838, Desha County was formed from Arkansas County in the new state of Arkansas. The first county seat was at Napoleon, a river port located at the conflux of the Arkansas and Mississippi Rivers. Because Napoleon frequently flooded, the site was abandoned in the 1870s. The county seat was first moved to Chicot County in 1873, and in 1877 moved to its current location in Arkansas City. In the 1880s, when the X. O. Pindall Building was constructed, Arkansas City was the most populous community in Desha

County, hosting a prosperous economy fueled by timber industry and river boat traffic.

The most recognized occupant of the building was Mr. Xenophon Overton Pindall. Mr. Pindall practiced law there as deputy prosecuting attorney before becoming Governor of Arkansas in 1907. Xenophon was the son of Lebbeus and Nora (Snell) Pindall. Born in Monroe County, Missouri he grew up in Arkansas where his father and uncle were well-known attorneys. He received his law degree in Little Rock and soon began the practice of law with his cousin in Arkansas City, in Desha County. He served as deputy prosecuting attorney. After being elected to the Arkansas State Senate in 1906, he was chosen to be its president pro tempore. Governor Little was forced to resign his office less than a month after his inauguration, because of a physical and emotional breakdown. Senate president Moore served as acting governor from February 1907, until May of 1907, when Pindall took over governorship in his official duties as president of the Arkansas State Senate. Pindall's term expired in January of 1909. While acting governor, X. O. Pindall enacted a pure food and drug law, imposed a franchise tax on foreign corporations, and passed a measure designed to prevent price discrimination.

In addition to housing the Arkansas City Museum from the mid-1960s until the early 1990s, the building once served as office space for the levee board. The building is currently being restored with the help of a grant provided by the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program. The present owner Robert Moore has also donated a conservation easement on the exterior of the building.

The X. O. Pindall Office is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria B and C with local significance for its association with Governor Pindall and as an excellent example of a 1880s single-story Italianate commercial building.

National Register of Historic Places - Return Comments:

The current documentation is being returned so that substantive and technical issues regarding the nomination can be addressed. Upon completion of the revisions the National Register can proceed with formal consideration of the property.

Criteria A/B:

The nomination cover form notes Criterion <u>A</u> and C, but the text refers to Criteria <u>B</u> and C. It is not clear (for Criterion B purposes) whether there are any other extant buildings associated with X. O. Pindall that reflect his important contributions. Nor is it clear how this particular building is associated with his most important contributions within the area of politics government, since the building was built and occupied a considerable period before his term as governor. The current nomination relies heavily on his terms as state senator/governor, but fails to show how this 1882 building can convey any aspect of that later significance or important earlier contributions. Without more justification and elaboration I would suggest dropping Criterion B and Pindall from "Significant Person." With a little more work it might be possible to justify local significance under Criterion A, by demonstrating how this building might reflect the themes of early law practice in small towns and the importance of Pindall's work within the local community, perhaps even setting him up in a position of local influence that allowed him to later pursue statewide office. More information is necessary to justify the significance. The period of significance should also be adjusted to better reflect any period of historic use and association.

Criterion C:

We also discussed the fact that the current architectural statement provided no contextual information with which to understand the significance of the property. Such a nomination should discuss both the local context for the property type and the existence of any comparative examples. The one paragraph continuation page you submitted handled the comparative issue, but still left the importance of the basic property type unstated. We have no idea whether *brick*, *vernacular Italianate commercial buildings* were an important local property type, a rarity, a sign of affluence, a common building form, or a one-time anomaly. Suggested approaches might include an elaboration on one of the following themes/statements: "Brick vernacular Italianate forms were typical of the type of commercial development which occurred in Mississippi River towns during the late nineteenth century, reflecting both a ready availability of building materials and the mobility of building styles and forms." Or "While wood-frame buildings dominated local development, brick construction was increasingly seen in commercial architecture by the late nineteenth century and eventually dominated such development. The vernacular Italianate became the most utilized stylistic form, characterizing many such river towns." "Extant examples clearly reflect important building traditions associated with the late nineteenth century period in eastern Arkansas."

The building is situated at the edge of a residential neighborhood, a few blocks away from what was once the thriving commercial district of Arkansas City. The Xenophon Overton Pindall Law Office is the oldest of only six extant older commercial buildings located in Arkansas City. Three of Arkansas City's early twentieth century commercial buildings were recently nominated to the National Register to create the Arkansas City Commercial Historic District (NR listed 02/18/99).

Summary

The Xenophon Overton Pindall Law Office is being nominated to the National Register under Criterion C with local significance as an excellent example of a 1880s single-story commercial building constructed in the Italianate manner. Besides being the only extant representative of the Italianate style in Arkansas City, the small building is also the city's oldest extant commercial building. The Italianate style was a common idiom within Arkansas' Delta commercial centers. For instance, the Cherry Street Historic District (NR listed 8/17/87) located in Helena, Arkansas contains several examples of two-story vernacular Italianate commercial buildings: 319 Cherry Street (PH0042); 317 Cherry Street (PH0043); 315 Cherry Street (PH0044); 421 Cherry Street (PH0030); 429 Cherry Street (PH0026); 509 Cherry Street (PH0024); 511-513 Cherry Street (PH0022); 517 Cherry Street(PH0021); and 519-523 Cherry Street (PH0020). Intact examples of one-story Italianate business buildings are not common today.

The building is one of the few surviving historic commercial structures in Arkansas City. Many other buildings of similar date have succumbed to flood, fire and neglect. The survival of the X. O. Pindall Building through the flood of 1927 can be attributed to its raised floor and solid brick construction. Thereafter the building's survival in the face of a waning economy was because of its successful adaptive reuse as a levee board meeting place, and a local museum. The building is currently being restored with the help of a grant provided by the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program. The present owner Robert Moore has also donated a conservation easement on the exterior of the building.

The X. O. Pindall Office is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with local significance and as an excellent example of an 1880s single-story, vernacular interpretation of an Italianate commercial building.





The Xenophon Overton Pindall Law Office is significant under National Register Criterion C (Architecture). The modest brick office building is a vernacular interpretation of the Italianate style popular during the late nineteenth century in Arkansas Delta communities. The c.1882 law office is among the oldest extant commercial properties in Arkansas City and an important reflection of period values and building forms.


