

The Clarksville Methodist Church is the oldest building, which has been a church, in the city. It housed religious congregations for more than fifty years. Moreover, it is one of the earliest brick buildings in Clarksville. The function of the building changed in the late 19th century, and it has been used as a residence or boarding house for more than ninety years.
