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Description: The John C. Breckinridge Memorial on the courthouse lawn in Lexington is two parts: a bronze statute and a granite pedestal. The monument was erected in 1887 by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The monument is approximately 25 feet tall with the statute and the pedestal being of equal height. The pedestal is plain except for the face which bears the inscription: "John Cabell Breckinridge erected by the Commonwealth of Kentucky A.D. 1887." The statute is very typical of 19th Century figures. Breckinridge stands in Mid-nineteenth Century attire, one hand resting on a draped object while the other is an outstretched palm.

Statement of Significance: The John C. Breckinridge Memorial meets National Register Criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This is a good example of property type "statute." Breckinridge served as vice-president of the United States under James Buchanan. He ran for president in 1860 under the dissident Southern Wing of the Democratic Party. He was a Confederate general and Secretary of War. The monument was erected by the Commonwealth of Kentucky in 1887 to honor the memory of a man who fought against his state during the Civil War.

Verbal Boundary Description - The John C. Breckinridge Monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of fifteen feet centered on the monument located on the west lawn of the Fayette County Courthouse.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
