DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hampton County Courthouse was constructed in 1878 as the official seat of government for the newly created county of Hampton. The only courthouse Hampton County has ever known, the Hampton County Courthouse was built in the Victorian Italianate style which was popular in the last quarter of the 19th Century. Although the architect of the building is unknown, local tradition indicates that elements of the courthouse design were derived from similar courthouses designed in the state during the 1820s by Robert Mills.

As originally constructed, the Hampton County Courthouse was a two-story structure constructed of brick laid in the common bond pattern. Three bays wide in the "ABA" configuration, the structure featured 4/4 windows capped with stilted segmental arches on the second floor and flat brick lintels on the first floor. The hip roof had four triangular pediments with open cornices and rondelles located in the center of all four sides of the building. Originally there were four corbel capped chimneys located on the west side of the building and one corbel capped chimney located on the east side. The entablature which encircled the courthouse was bracketed, as was typical of Victorian period architecture. The original entrance portico was located in a projecting bay on the front (north) facade.Symmetrical semi-elliptical stairways, supported by brick, rose to the second floor. The balustrade and hand rails were wrought iron. The flat roofed portico was supported by four Tuscan columns. Brackets around the cornice matched those featured on the remainder of the building.

In 1925, the Hampton County Courthouse was renovated and additional wings were added to the north (front) and south (rear) facades according to plans drawn up by Lafaye and Lafaye, Architects of Columbia, South Carolina. The building's current appearance dates from the 1925 renovation. The design of the north and south additions follows the same general style of the original structure. Each wing is two bays deep, which makes the entire structure ten bays deep. Treatment of the entablature, pediments, corner pilasters and windows match those of the 1878 building. In 1925, all chimneys were removed from the original courthouse and the main entrance was changed from the second to the first floor. The stairway and portico were removed and both doorways were recessed approximately two feet. At present, a narrow portico supported by four Tuscan columns covers the main entrance. The second floor doorway is located behind a semi-elliptical arch.

The interior floor plan of the courthouse remains essentially as it was originally. The architraves of the original doors remain intact, as do many of the window lintels.

Plans are currently underway for the restoration-renovation of the courthouse. In 1977, the building was sandblasted as a preliminary part of this project. Plans for the restoration-renovation include a placement of a portico similar to the original on the front facade and the placement of an additional wing across the rear of the building.

<u>SURROUNDINGS</u>: The Hampton County Courthouse is located in the central square of Hampton, South Carolina, a town of approximately 2600 people. Hampton is the county seat of Hampton County, an agricultural area whose population is approximately 15,000.

Also located within the nominated acreage are two small modern annexes situated directly to the rear of the courthouse, and a circa 1935 two-story brick annex located directly to the east of the courthouse. All three of these annexes house county offices. They have been included within the nominated acreage because of their very close proximity to the courthouse and their location in the courthouse square.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located in the center of the town of Hampton, South Carolina, the Hampton County Courthouse was constructed in 1878 as the seat of government for the newly created Hampton County. Since that date, the Hampton County Courthouse has been a focal point of community life. Today, the Courthouse is widely regarded by residents of Hampton County as the most notable landmark remaining in the county.

In 1877, a group of citizens residing in the northwest section of Beaufort County petitioned the General Assembly of South Carolina to form a new county in order to provide them with better political representation. As a result, on February 18, 1878, the General Assembly enacted a law which established Hampton County as the thirty-third county in the state. Named after Governor Wade Hampton, the new county was to be administered by a Board of five County Commissioners who were empowered to establish a county seat and provide suitable buildings for county activities. A site for a new county seat was chosen on the basis of its central location. In a spirit of public interest, prominent local citizens donated land for the courthouse square and building materials for the construction of the courthouse building. Although the architect chosen for the new courthouse is unknown, local tradition indicates that the plan of the building was drawn from similar courthouses designed in the state during the early 1800s by Robert Mills. The Hampton County Courthouse was dedicated by Governor Wade Hampton in 1878.

The town known as "Hampton Courthouse" soon grew up around the new courthouse building and in 1879 the town was officially incorporated. (This name "Hampton Courthouse" was subsequently shortened to Hampton.) Several citizens instrumental in the construction of the courthouse built substantial Victorian residences in the new county seat and by 1879 Hampton had the county's first newspaper, <u>The Hampton Guardian</u>. Subsequently, the Hampton County Courthouse has served as the focal point of activity in town and county events for 100 years. Until 1976 all county offices were housed in the Courthouse and the building is still in active use as the governmental center of Hampton County. Closely connected with all aspects of life in Hampton County, the courthouse square has for thirty-six years been the site of the Hampton County Watermelon Festival. One of the oldest festivals in South Carolina, this yearly event has been of great local importance to the area.






