Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The over seventeen acre grounds of the James C. Fellows House help retain some of the feeling of the original setting for this local landmark. It is reportedly the only such Italiante brick residence in town. A circular drive connects the south-facing house with the highway and the sparsely built-up residential area. In the back, a wooded area drops off to a lower level and Watson's Creek. Fellows used clay from the creekbed to make the bricks for his house. A country club and railroad tracks flank either side of the property.

The Fellows House is a handsome example of the Italianate Style applied to a simple and commodious farmhouse. The roofline, its low-pitched, hipped roof, broad eaves and regularly placed wood brackets, provide Italianate features. The segmental arches of the long and slender windows are additional Italianate characteristics. The house did not originally have the porch with elongated brackets over the main entrance. It does not appear in an 1875 photograph, but the porch is present in a 1934 photgraph as is a simple, wood widow's walk. The pendants of the porch brackets felicitously complement those of the eaves.

The plan is a modified L-shape, with the square living quarters on the west dominating. The original two rooms of this portion have been enlarged to one with the removal of a connecting wall. A small open porch, its columns removed, is tucked against the entry hall with the dining room just behind it and the kitchen to the east.

Five generations of Fellows have naturally made modifications to the original house, but they have not seriously marred the integrity of the building. Among the additions are shutters, a small screen porch onthe west, bathrooms, and the iron porch railings. Modifications include a new front porch without columns, an east kitchen window, new basement entry roof, enclosed back porch, and enlarged living room. The roof is wood shingle. The dining room and one second floor room retain the original wide wood flooring, but the major rooms have narrow hardwood floors.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Although the significance of the Fellows House is primarily as a local architectural landmark, the James C. Fellows family also calls attention to the earliest settlement of Riceville and to the Fellows' family role in establishing early commercial ventures.

James C. Fellows, a brick mason by trade, apparently came to the newly settled Riceville vicinity with his physician brother, Harris, in 1856. In that year the first store in town, Kerr & Fellows, opened. The Fellows family also build and operated a hotel in town in later years.

By 1871 Fellows had begun to make bricks from the clay on his property at Watson's Creek. As mentioned in his daily diary, the bricks for his house came from his own brickyard. It is unlikely the brickworks were a large scale business, especially since a fire in 1901 consumed most of the woodframe Riceville commercial district, including the wood Hotel Fellows. If Fellows had been busily supplying bricks since his arrival in 1856, it seems that more of Riceville would have been built of that fire resistant material. Fellows did not live to see his adopted town burn, for he died in 1898.
