19. History On 9 May 1857, Richard Southgate sold 112 acres of land on Tug Fork Creek to Abraham Uhle for \$900. His step-daughter, Katharina Uhl, who inherited the farm, was born in Ichenheim, Baden, in 1830. Her first husband, Peter Schrier, was born in Prussia in 1824 and died at

- 19) Tug Fork in 1863. Katharina Uhl Schrier subsequently married John Sauser in 1864. Tradition states that Sauser (1833-1918), a native of Germany, built the house soon after the marriage. When his son, Elias Sauser, was baptised at St. John's Lutheran Church in 1871, John Sauser was listed as a "farmer and miller of Tug Fork." John Sauser was the present owner's grandfather while Mrs. Sauser's family were the Hecks, having come to Tug Fork from Prussia.

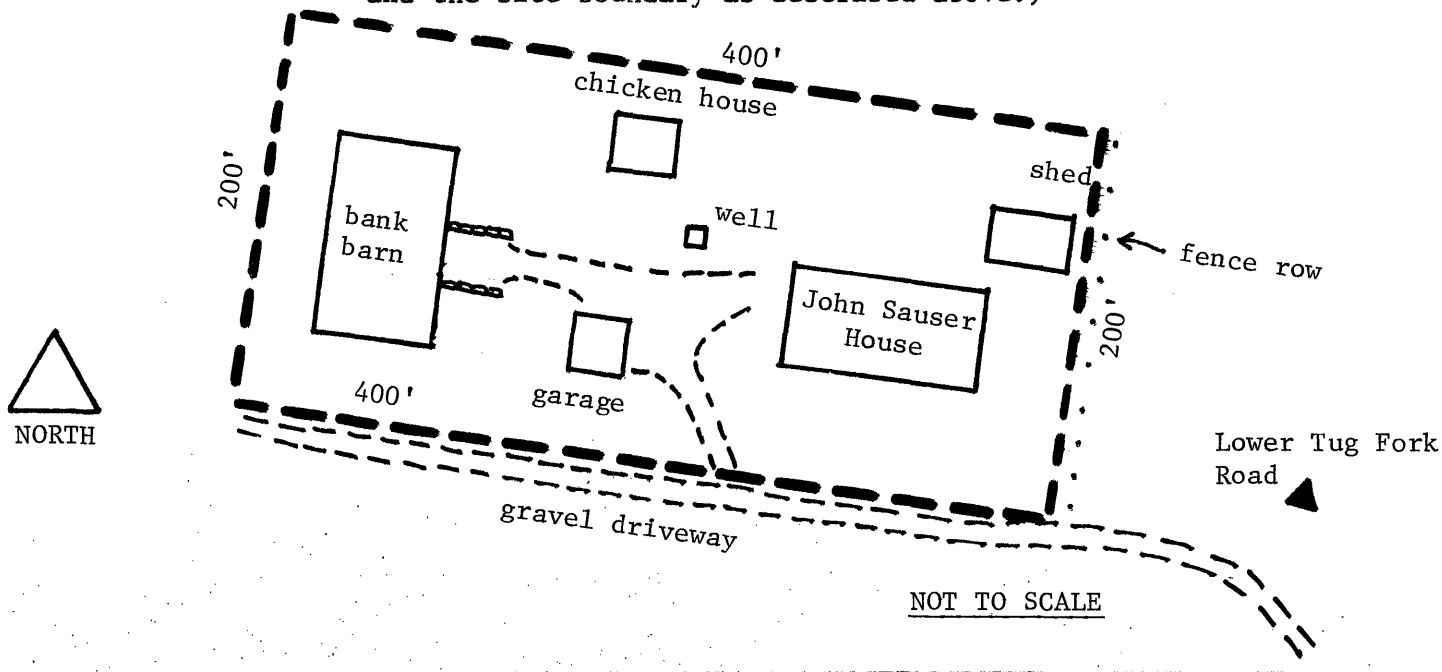

Verbal Boundary Description Acreage 1.8 acre

Beginning at a point approximately 400' NW of the intersection of Sauser driveway and Lower Tug Fork Road, proceed west 400' along said driveway, then proceed north 200' up a cleared hillside, then east 400' along side of side hill, then proceed south 200' down the hill to point of origin. Boundaries include stone house, bank barn, well, and outbuildings.
