


18. wings of the church and is pierced with a pointed-arched, stained-glass window on the lower floor. The tower rises above the roof line with a pyramidal roof. The upper story has arched openings on each face. The east face of the structure has a large central stained-glass window group with wood tracery. The group is flanked by a single window on either side. The treatment of the gable is the same as on the south face.
