Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The property at 306 S. Jackson Street is situated on a prominent streetcorner location south of the First Presbyterian Church at the Chickasaw street intersection, near the Brookhaven central business district. The one-and-a-half-story multigable-on-hip-roof frame structure measures four by seven bays, and features four highly textural and asymmetrical elevations characteristic of the Queen Anne period. Stylized extended-gable-end front and side elevations have chamfered corners, imbricated wood-shingled gable ends, and decorative vergeboards and brackets with sunburst-pattern wood trim. A finely detailed verandah with turned posts and a sawn balustrade forms a layer around the front (east) and side (north) elevations, with panels which repeat the sunburst-pattern motif. On the rear (west) elevation, an extended gable-roof section is flanked by a shed roof porch (now glassed in) with its original latticed panels intact. A hipped dormer is situated above the first-floor entrance door; another gabled dormer was added on the rear (west) elevation during the rehabilitation of the house in 1979. The entire roof of the structure was raised slightly during the rehabilitation to increase ceiling height on the second floor of the interior. The brick pier foundation is rimmed by a continuous brick foundation wall. This basement space, now used for storage, shows evidence of former service rooms. A simple rectangular gable-roof outbuilding (ca. 1920) with a boxed cornice is located approximately twenty feet west of the house.

The interior of 306 S. Jackson Street consists of the center hall plan, three rooms deep, with an extra room added at the rear after the enclosure of the shed porch in 1979. Late-nineteenth century decorative features on the interior include the (northeast) parlor mantelpiece, with shouldered architraves decorated with carved garlands, acanthus leaves and a central cartouche. Doorways are surmounted by glass transoms and are finished with symmetrical architraves with carved corner blocks. A double-leaf door set with beveled glass and trimmed with egg-and-dart molding leads from the front parlor to a second room (now used as an office). In 1979, rooms in the previously unfinished second floor were sheetrocked and trimmed with flat-faced architraves for use as office space.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The property at 306 S. Jackson Street is an outstanding small-scale example of the eclectic and picturesque design quality characteristic of the Queen Anne period in Mississippi. Retaining most of its original exterior and interior detail after rehabilitation in 1979 as a professional office facility, the former residence is exemplary of a successful adaptive use project.

Deed records indicate that a dwelling house was constructed on the site as early as 1861, by Thomas A. Magee (Lincoln Co., Miss., Deed Book 40: 570). After a succession of owners the property was acquired by James F. Miazza in 1896 (Deed Book 15: 465). Miazza evidently remodeled or rebuilt the house between 1896 and its sale in 1902 to W.F. Jobes (Deed Book 33; 201), which accounts for the structure's late-nineteenth-century appearance. The architectural significance of the property is derived from the application of typical Queen Anne features such as multi-planar roof surfaces, assymetrical elevations, and a variety of eclectically inspired decorative and textural detail. Further, the house provides a striking contrast to more conservative Neoclassical style residences more commonly associated with Rehabilitation of the house Brookhaven's early twentieth-century growth period. by the present owner was accomplished under the direction of the present owner and local craftsman-contractor Denver Gene Weeks. Satisfactorily adapting the structure for office use, the architectural integrity of both the exterior elevations and the interior plan was not impaired after completion of the project in November, 1979.
